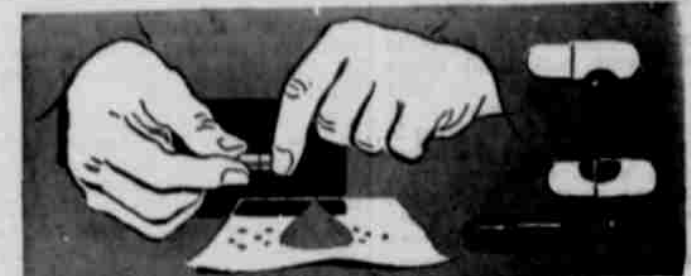
Attend Final Game
