## Colts Lose Twice To Buff Jayvees

Heppner high's jayvees basketball team took a sound drubbing by Madras' young Buffaloes Friday night here, 47 to 27, but after getting over first-of-the-season jitters, came back fighting Saturday night and lost to the same team by only six points, 51 to 45.

Halftime Friday night saw them trailing 23-12, and they lost more ground in the third quarter. Thus, it was 34-14 going into the final frame. They did swing into gear in the last quarter, though, and almost equalled the first three quarters' point production in the single stanza, making 13.

But they came back intent on winning Saturday night, capturing the first quarter 13 to 10 before yielding a slim edge at halftime, 22 to 21, to the young Buffs. They slipped a little more in the third quarter, which ended 37 to 31 for the Buffs, and held about even in the last period for the final 51-43 score.

Top point maker for Coach Jim Sutherland's squad was Ken Smith with 22, getting 12 the first night and 10 the second. Richard Clark totalled 19, only three of which came Friday night. He sharpened his shooting eye Saturday and potted 16 for high for Heppner but Clowers of Madras was game high with 18.

When city police arrived they found Edward Glenn Judd, 38, an intruder who had apparently stepped off a beam through the plaster ceiling, falling partially into the apartment occupied by Mrs. Aldridge. He had a 5-inch steak knife in his coat pocket and was booked by police on charges of carrying a concealed weapon and for after-hours violation.

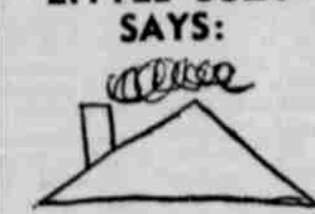
He told police, "I came to see a friend."
