Each day, clothes worn have to be washed immediately or they will mildew.

The Goodmans are enjoying a year's furlough in the states after spending eight years in Borneo. This is their second trip home during that time. They feel that their work there has been very successful.

Before making the carrier landings, the students must qualify on mock carrier landing strips ashore.



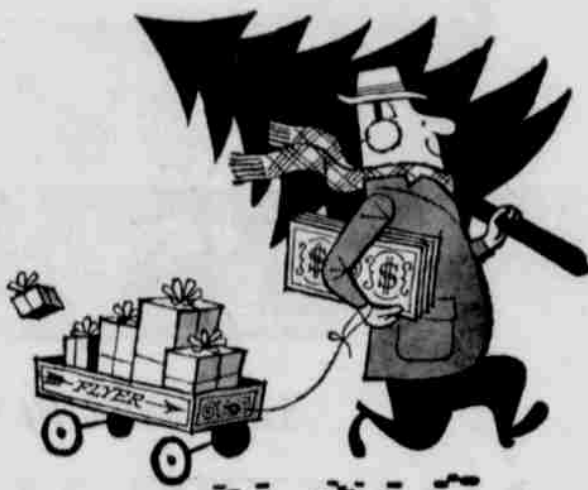
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
