THIS IS the season for lots of baking, goodies for the family and entertaining. I have gathered a few candy and cookie recipes for you to try. Most of them I have sampled with only one complaint, one bite calls for another, etc., etc!

THE FIRST is a Fudge recipe from Mrs. Ned Sweek and the second is a chocolate covered coconut mounds and comes from Mrs. Riley Munkers. Lillian and Bebe each year get together to make many different kinds of candy for Christmas.

FUDGE
Mix together:
2 cups sugar
3/4 cups milk
1/4 cup cocoa
Cook slowly to a soft ball (236 degrees). Remove from stove, add 3 tablespoons butter and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Let cool without stirring, beat until it loses its gloss, add one-half cup nuts and pour into greased pan.

Chocolate Covered Coconut Mounds
Mix together:
2 boxes powdered sugar (sifted)
1/4 lb. butter or margarine (softened)
1 can eagle brand sweetened condensed milk
1 t vanilla
1 box angel flake coconut
Mixture will be very stiff, roll into small balls and drop onto foil wrap and let stand overnight to dry.

Chocolate Covering
Melt over double boiler:
3/4 bar of Parafin
1/2 packages chocolate chips (dark or light)
After mixture is thoroughly melted, place mounds on toothpick and dip. Keep mixture in pan over hot water to keep at correct temperature.

HERE'S A cookie recipe from Mrs. Merritt Gray. Maxine says they are easy to make and very tasty.

Thumbprint Cookies
Mix together:
1/2 cup shortening
3/4 cup sugar
1 egg
3 T milk
Sift together and stir in:
1 cup flour (sifted)
1/2 t salt
Roll into 1 inch balls, dip in
