Highway Accidents Stalk Christmas Eve

The most dangerous time of the year for traffic is just ahead. It will come, state safety officials remind, on Christmas Eve when the fatal accident rate is five times greater than for the remainder of the holiday.

"Death by automobile is pointless and needless at any time, but on a holiday such as Christmas Eve it becomes even more tragic," according to Warner Nunn, chairman of the Oregon Traffic Safety Commission.

Nunn said Oregon recorded four deaths on Christmas Eve last year, seven for the entire holiday period.

"Officials of all traffic law enforcement agencies warn against drinking intoxicants if driving, yet too many drivers take a chance—putting themselves above the law and placing their passengers in unnecessary danger," he pointed out.

"No Christmas will be a merry one," he concluded, "if it's marred by accident."

Place plenty of soap chips or flakes in a little water. Beat lightly with a wire mesh spoon, just enough to get a nice, thick foam. Smear on needles and stems, allow to dry and you have a beautiful winter woodland scene.

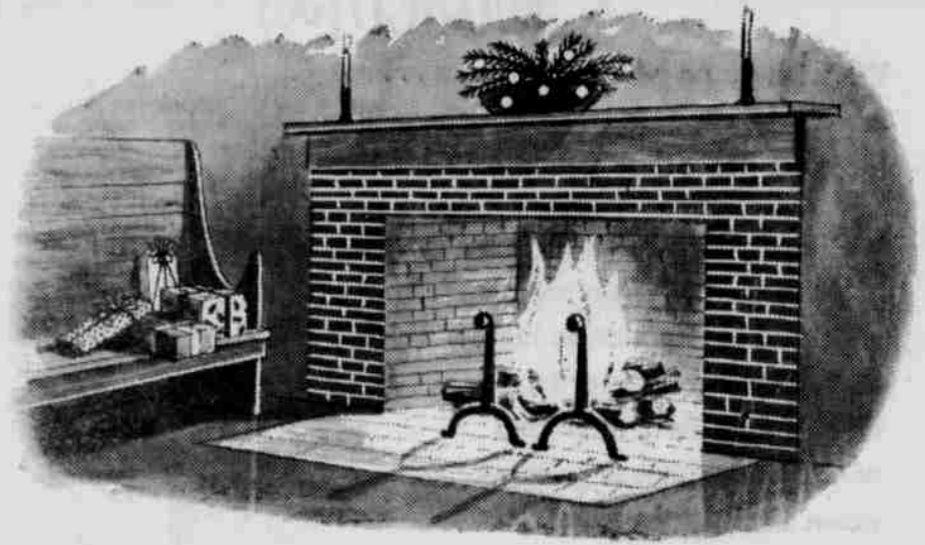
