IONE—Fourteen members answered the roll call with Christmas thoughts at the monthly meeting of the Ione Garden Club on Tuesday at the home of Mrs. Omar Rietmann. Assisting the hostess was Mrs. Dale Ray.

President, Mrs. Phil Emert, presided at the meeting, where the members decided to light the Oregon Spruce Tree they planted last year in the city park and to light the fireplace with Christmas lights, also located in the park. Mrs. Phil Emert and Mrs. Ralph Crum, committee for decorations, will purchase additional lights. The club will observe the Twelfth Night burning of trees and greens on Saturday, January 6, at 4:30 p. m. on the Omar Rietmann vacant lot across from the Catholic church.

The activities on which the club is working includes the making of swags by the members for the 15 business houses and the city hall.

Mrs. Rietmann gave a report on birds at the meeting. She told of Columbus sighting two brown Pelicans and sparrows on September 18, 1492, which told him land was near. On October 3, 1492 he saw more Pelicans which are land birds. Mrs. Rietmann also reported on the Bald Eagle. They are protected in the state of Alaska. In the South-eastern part two men found thirteen nests and eight pair of the birds. An interesting fact about the bald eagle—they generally lay three eggs, but only one grows to maturity.

Mrs. Fredrick Martin, chairman of the Street Tree Planting project, presented a program on the best trees for planting in Ione.

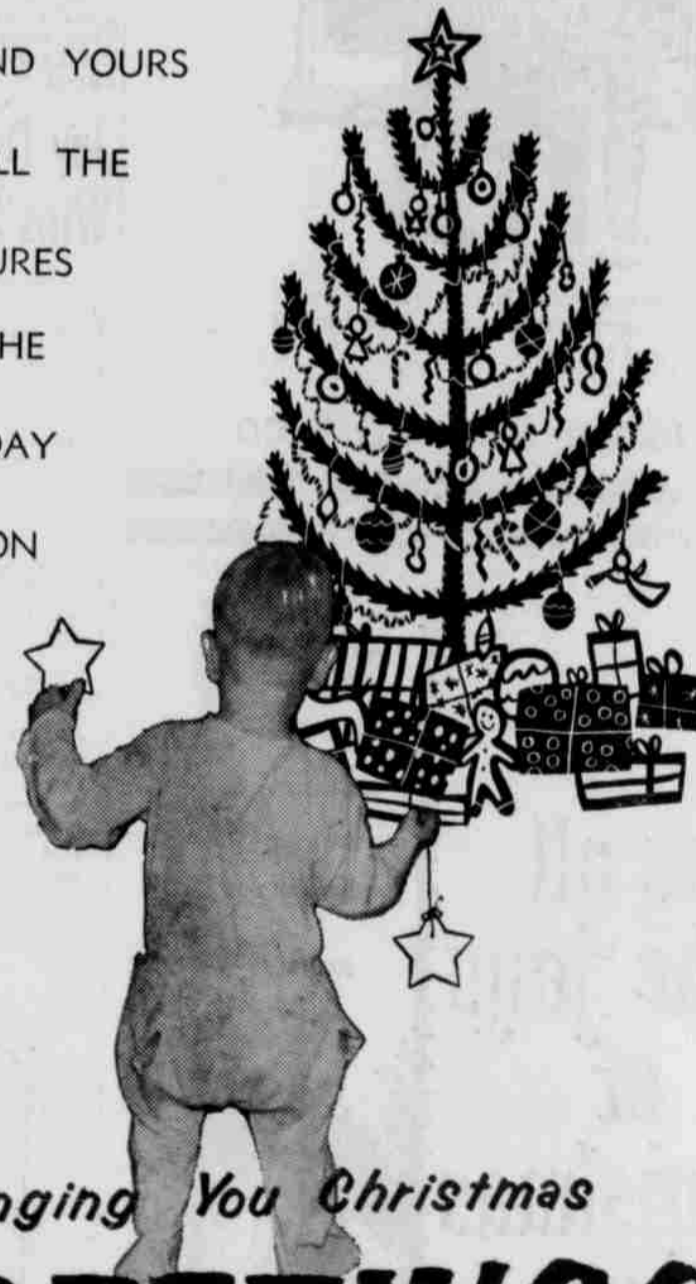
