Community To Join In The Traditional Burning of Greens

IONE—Ione Garden club will again observe "Twelfth Night" ceremonies on Saturday evening, January 6, twelve nights after Christmas. The burning of the Christmas trees and greens will take place at the vacant lot across from the City Park in Ione. The time has been set for 4:30 p. m. Everyone is welcome to this event which the Ione Garden club sponsors annually, more as a service to the community rather than as a core-munity or custom. Although "Twelfth Night" is an old ancient custom widely celebrated in England on January 6, as an ending to the Civil Holidays where much feasting and celebrating was observed, the Ione Garden club feels this is an opportune time to collect and burn the Christmas trees and greens which would otherwise clutter yards, curbs and streets.

We have not forgotten the special citation received from the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs a year ago, commending the Ione Garden club for observing "Twelfth Night" ceremonies by burning Christmas trees and greens on January 6 of each year.

Carols and hymns will be sung and refreshments will be served. Everyone is welcome.

Renewal Form Use Urged by Department

Notices mailed to Oregon car owners to remind them to renew their car licenses should be returned to the Department of Motor Vehicles with the check.

The department said today many people either are destroying or misplacing the renewal reminder form. This causes a delay in processing.

Use of the renewal form speeds processing for the department and enables the car owner to get a valid registration card much sooner, officials said.

The department sends the renewal notice about one month prior to the expiration date on license plates. Part of the reminder becomes the registration card when validated by the department, but if the notice is lost or destroyed a new registration card must be prepared.
