Anglers, Hunters Need '62 Licenses
Oregon hunters and fishermen are reminded by the game commission that their 1961 licenses have run out. If sportsmen intend to be out hunting or fishing at the beginning of the year, 1962 licenses must be in their possession.
There has been no change in the license fees for 1962. The commission said \$4.00 for an angling license, \$4.00 for a hunting license or \$7.00 for the combination. Juvenile licenses—if they do not intend to hunt for big game—remain the same at \$2.00 per license. The salmon steelhead license remains at \$1.00, which is in addition to a regular angling license.
Affected most will be steelhead anglers intending to fish through the holidays or waterfowl hunters out on New Year's day for a bit of duck shooting. Varmint and predator hunters must also have new licenses if they intend to be out after the first of the year.
Hunting and fishing licenses may be purchased at any license dealer or at the game commission's Portland office.

PUC Authorizes New Crossings At Arlington

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, has been authorized by the state public utility commissioner to construct two over-crossings and six grade crossings of the Union Pacific Railroad and its Condon Branch Line in conjunction with the relocation of Highway U.S. 30, UP's main and branch lines and certain city streets in Arlington.
The Corps of Engineers is moving these facilities to new locations in the Arlington area to make way for the water storage basin of the new John Day dam now being built on the Columbia River to the west of this community.

The crossings authorized by Commissioner Jemel C. Hill are:
1. A permanent grade crossing of UP's main line at a new street which has been designated as Cottonwood Street by city planners.
2. A permanent 1420' long overcrossing which will carry Highway U.S. 30 traffic over UP's Condon Branch line and four roads.

3. A temporary overcrossing of a rail "shoo fly" connection to the existing Condon Branch Line.
4. A permanent grade crossing of the relocated Condon Branch Line and the approach ramp to Highway 30 east of Arlington.
5. A temporary grade crossing at Beech Street.
6. A permanent grade crossing at Locust Street.
7. A temporary grade crossing at Locust Street.
8. A temporary grade crossing at 2nd Street which will provide access for fire protection of homes on east side of Arlington while construction is underway. Hill ordered that all the crossings be adequately signed for the protection of the public.

Seat Belt Use In Autos Urged By Health Board

The Oregon State Board of Health in the interest of saving lives and reducing injury urges every car owner to install and use safety seat belts.
Safety seat belts have been thoroughly tested and have already saved thousands of lives and reduced countless injuries. In any collision, an automobile is stopped suddenly, but the people inside, unless restrained in some way, still have movement and are hurled into the steering wheel, dashboard, windshield, or worse, out of the car, the board reports.
Persons thrown from accident vehicles are five times more likely to be injured fatally than those who stay inside, according to a nationwide study.
Seat belts should be fastened at all times when the car is in motion. Contrary to some misguided notions, seat belts offer great protection at moderate speeds. More than half of the accidents causing injury or death involve speeds of less than 40 miles per hour. Figures also show that three out of four traffic deaths occur within 25 miles of home.
Less than one per cent of all injury-producing accidents involve fire or submersion. Seat belts greatly improve your chances of surviving such an accident because it can increase your chances of remaining conscious, so you can get clear of a submerged or burning car. An instant with one hand. Seat belts belong attached around each occupant when the car is in motion.

Bank Debits Show Gain in November

Bank debits for Morrow and Umatilla counties increased in November, 1961, compared to November, 1960, according to the University of Oregon Bureau of Business Research.
Debits for November, 1961, totaled \$87,753,990. For October, 1961, the total was \$38,089,560, and for November, 1960 the total was \$37,554,357.

Oregon, with 235 banks reporting, had an increase in bank debits in November, 1961, of 5.4 percent as compared with October, 1961 and an increase of 7.6 percent from November, 1960. Total debits for Oregon in November, 1961, came to \$2,318,391,347. For October, 1961, the total was \$2,199,223,601 and for November, 1960, the total was \$2,153,663,134.
