Federal Income Tax Help Offered

A. G. Erickson, district director of the Internal Revenue Service for Oregon, announced today that the period for filing 1961 Federal income tax returns will extend from January 2 to April 16, inclusive.

In order to provide adequate information to taxpayers during this period, the Pendleton office will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 4:45 p. m. each Monday from January 8 to April 16 inclusive. It will be open Tuesday, January 2, in lieu of Monday, January 1, which is a legal holiday. The office address is 113 County Courthouse and telephone number is CR 6-7652.

The Portland office, 827 N. E. Oregon Street (Telephone BE 4-8211), will provide information service each workday from January 2 through April 16, and will provide information 8:00 a. m. to 4:45 p. m., Saturday, April 14. Office hours for tax information at Portland will be from 8:00 a. m. to 4:45 p. m.

Erickson stated that, "The taxpayer coming in for help will be asked to fill out as much of his return as possible, and he will be given information needed to complete the return." He suggested that the taxpayer should telephone for information before coming to an Internal Revenue Service office, since essentially the same service is available by telephone as at the offices.

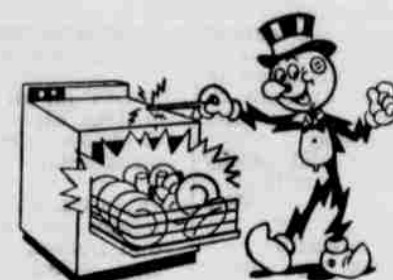
