

Spring Trout Due At Bull Prairie

Oregon sport fishermen will be able to test their angling skill at two new man-made lakes when the season opens this coming spring.

Phil Schneider, state game director, said the new lakes completed this fall by the game commission include Cottonwood Meadows, located on Cottonwood creek about 22 miles southwest of Lakeview, and Bull Prairie, located at the head of Wilson creek 45 miles south of Heppner.

Cottonwood Meadows in the Fremont national forest will impound some 45 surface acres of angling water to an average depth of around 12 feet. Schneider said the lake was recently stocked with around 14,000 fingerling eastern brook trout which should be appearing in the angler's catch as good sized fish by midsummer.

Bull Prairie reservoir in the Umatilla national forest will impound around 25 surface acres and will provide a trout fishery in an area where no other lake exists. The reservoir is expected to be at full impoundment by

early spring. Schneider said that Bull Prairie was completed late last fall, but before the reservoir contained adequate water, snowfall blocked access which will delay the stocking program until the spring breakup. He said a planting of catchable sized trout should get the fishery off to a good start this coming summer.

The game commission bore the cost of construction of two lakes, built solely for angling purposes, according to Schneider. Their completion makes a total of four such impoundments built by the commission in an expanding program of water development for angling purposes. The other two include Trillium lake in the Mt. Hood national forest and Lofton reservoir in the Fremont national forest. The latter is actually the complete renovation of an existing reservoir which should produce good rainbow trout angling this coming summer.

The forest service will provide campgrounds and other recreational facilities.

Due to the basketball game and other conflicting dates the next regular meeting will be held jointly with the legion on January 25, with announcement later concerning this meeting.


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
