HERE'S A few tips on storing foods. Reunion Is Occasion For Entertaining

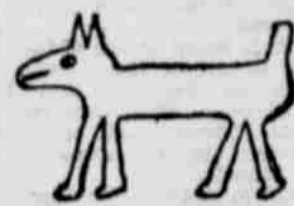
