Schools To Hear English Program

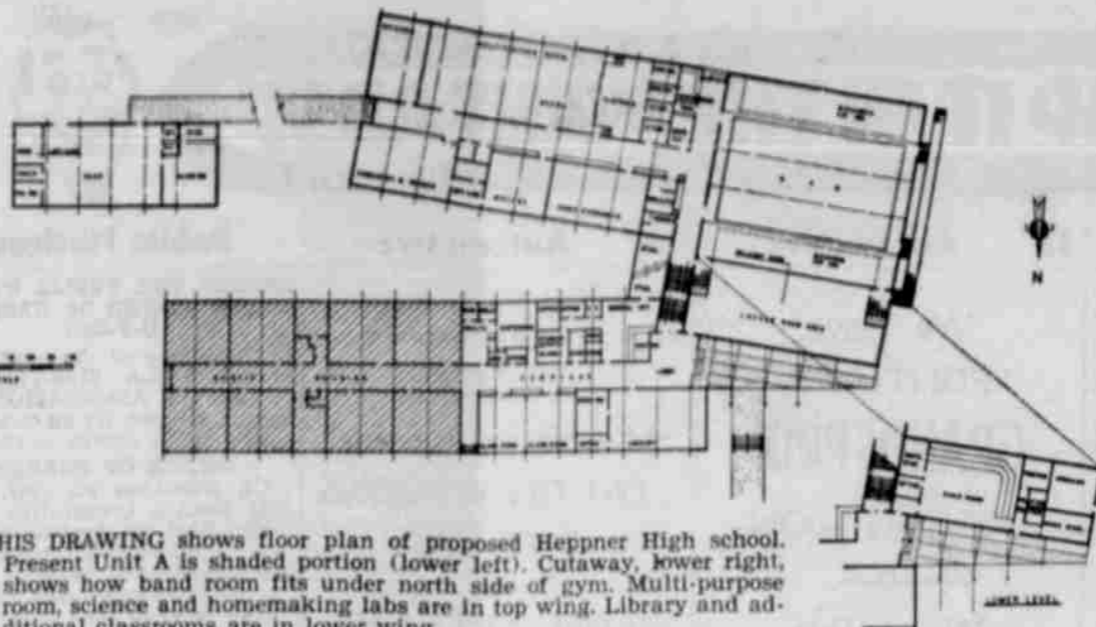

BOARDMAN—George Pitts, popular English entertainer, will present a program at a National School Assembly in the school gymnasium February 16 at 10:30 a. m.

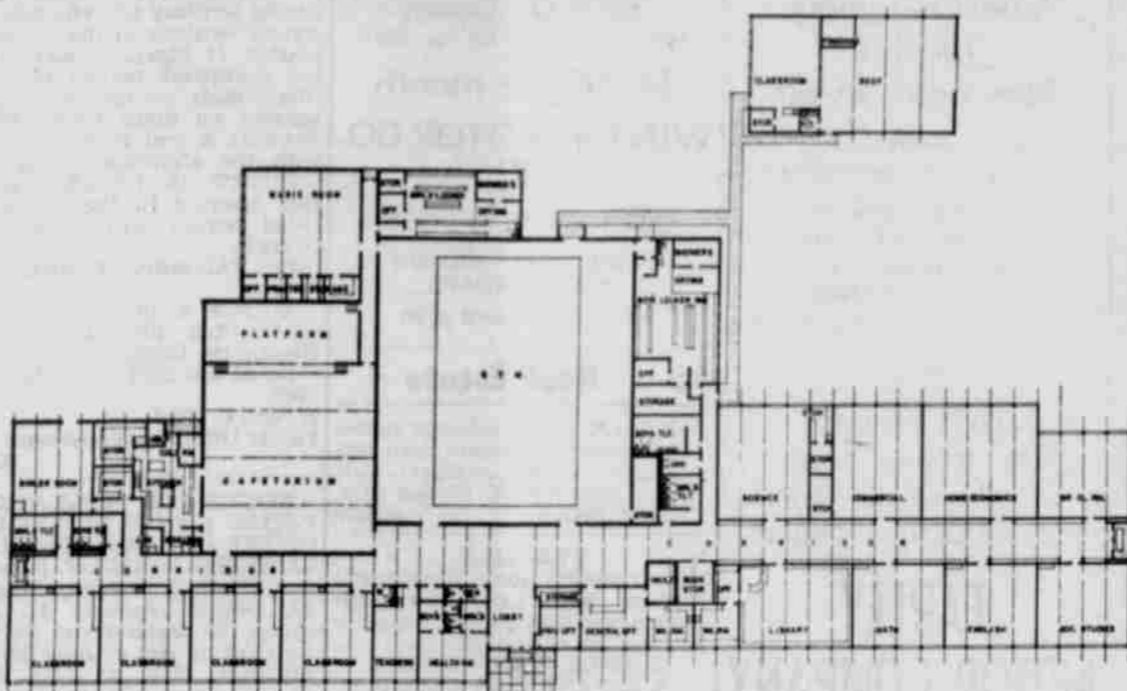

Council Approves Of Third Well

ing, 15x21 feet, would provide a three foot concrete runway around the present structure and would cost \$450.

"It's either that or chlorination," Grosheens said. The council voted to approve the new building.

Upon recommendation of Recorder Ted Smith the city will apply to the State Highway department for funds that would hard surface the Morgan street extension to the new high school site, including sidewalks, curbs and retaining walls. Under an Oregon law, cities have the right to apply for help from a \$250,000 fund of the department for streets within cities where heavy increased use is noticed.

However, applications against the fund are many, and whether the city will be successful in getting the aid is not known for sure, Smith said.

The council took action to ask Everett Struckmeier, owner of Hotel Heppner, to remove or repair an old sheet metal building behind the hotel. Sheet metal has been coming off the building in high winds and it constitutes a hazard, it was reported. Councilman John Pfeiffer later contacted Struckmeier and the latter assured the councilman that he would take care of the matter.

At the busy meeting, the council approved purchase of five new fire hydrants in accordance with its policy of continuously replacing older hydrants.

Councilmen approved purchase of 200 yards of crushed rock for \$450 and asked Recorder Smith to write to Herman Green and ask him to keep loads of debris on his sanitary service truck covered outside of the city limits on the way to the city dump. Complaints have been received by property owners, it

was reported, from matter coming off the truck.

Cleaning up the Willow Creek channel is hearing completion, the city superintendent reported. In the future spraying program will be undertaken to keep willows down. Good cooperation has been received from the public on the program, it was reported.
