CHERRY COBBLER
Mix:
2 1/2 cups pitted sour cherries
1 cup sugar
1 1/2 cups liquid (cherry juice plus water)
2 T butter, melted, mix with cherries and sugar
1/4 t almond extract or 1/4 t mace
2 T quick cooking tapioca
Place into 2-quart casserole.

TOPPING
1 cup sifted flour
1 cup sugar
2 t baking powder
1/2 t salt
1/3 cup shortening (Sylvia uses corn oil)
1 egg
Mix dry ingredients together, cut in shortening until mixed. Sprinkle over top of cherries, dot with butter, bake in 350 degree oven about 55 minutes or until well done.
