Full Program On Tap At Annual Beef Cattle Day

A popular event with Morrow county ranchers is the annual Beef Cattle Field Day at the Squaw Butte experiment station near Burns. The past several years a carload of ranchers have attended with Larry Lindsay, Ronald Currin, Don Greenup and the agent going in 1961. This year's program looks just as interesting as those in the past. The program that gets underway at 10:00 a. m. on Tuesday, March 27, will include many subjects that should be of value to our growers. There will be discussions on feeding high levels of salt for controlling supplement intake when water is limited; what combination of protein and energy will give optimum performance for wintering weaner calves; a discussion on the effects of limited hay feeding for wintering mature pregnant cows; results of feeding all-grain fattening rations; the stockman's responsibility in producing high quality beef carcasses; grain-hay improvement studies and developing a range supplementation program. During the afternoon a tour of current research at the station which will include a look at crossbreeding work, alfalfa pellets in the winter ration of weaner calves, digestibility studies, replacement heifers in breeding herd, performance tested bull calves and the laboratory. The program will be held this year at the Poison Creek Grange hall, two miles east of Burns on highway 78. Some Morrow county ranchers have indicated interest in attending this field day again this year. If you are interested contact this office so that we might get together in a travel pooling arrangement.

Walter Wright, Heppner, inquired this week about fresh cut bait for use on ground squirrels. We have a supply on hand now for early emerging squirrels and recommend its use at this time while there is still a shortage of feed for these rodents. It is a good idea to get the bait out now before young ones are born and make that many more to control.

The Peace Corps, created only one year ago, has gained a tremendous momentum. Congress, in the Peace Corps Act, set forth this purpose—"to promote world peace and friendship through a Peace Corps, which shall make available to interested countries men and women of the United States qualified for service abroad and willing to serve, under conditions of hardships if necessary, to help the peoples of such countries and areas in meeting their needs for trained man power, and to help promote a better understanding of the American people on the part of the people served, in a better

on the part of the American people." I have on my desk announcement of applications for openings in Bolivia and Ecuador. The Bolivia openings are filled with the exception of eight dairy farm assistants and 16 general farmers to work on small farms. The Ecuador calls for 14 agricultural extension generalists, ten tropical agriculturalists, two horticulturalists, one livestock man, one rural sociologist, three vocational agricultural teachers, six foresters, three soil conservationists, one environmental hygienist, and 16 home economists. Selection for these will be made on June 1 with the project going into training July 1. Those who remember her visit to Morrow county as an IFYE will be interested in knowing that Oregon's Myra McBride who enrolled in National 4-H Club Foundation project for Brazil has completed her basic training in Washington, D. C. She leaves Friday for further training and her two year assignment in Brazil. Any American citizen over 18 may apply for the Peace Corps. There is no upper age limits. Extension Course Will Be Offered Starting March 23

A 3 credit-hour evening course in education, The Maladjusted Child (Ed 463) will be taught at Heppner High school in Heppner Fridays and Saturdays of alternate week-ends, beginning March 23-24 by Dr. James Kearns, associate professor of education and psychology, Eastern Oregon College.

The EOC course, granting major or minor graduate credit, is offered through the general extension division of the state system of higher education. Dr. Roy Skeen, regional head, states that the program grants college credit from campus institutions of the state system.

Enrollments are accepted on either a credit or non-credit basis for \$11 per credit hour, with a \$22 minimum fee. Registration by mail packets may be obtained from the General Extension Division, Eastern Oregon College, La Grande, Oregon. Students may also pick up registration materials during the first class session.

Class hours are Fridays, 7:00 to 9:45 p. m.; Saturdays, 9:00 to 11:45 a. m.
