Winner Announced For Dimes Contest

Exemption Deadline Near For Veterans

Sheriff C. J. D. Bauman, Morrow county veterans' service officer, cautioned disabled war veterans and war widows today that they have only until March 30 to apply for their annual property tax exemptions.

The application must be filed with the county assessor in the court house, Bauman said. The exemption amounts to \$5700 of the true cash value of the property.

Those entitled include unmarried widows of war veterans, and veterans with disabilities of 40 per cent or more. Spanish-American war veterans don't have to prove disability to qualify.

A separate benefit is provided for widows and disabled veterans residing in house trailers, in the way of an annual license fee reduction of up to \$100.

Bauman said further details concerning both benefits are available at his office, located in the courthouse.
