**FILLED DATE SQUARES**  
 1/4 cup sugar  
 1 cup chopped dates  
 1/4 cup coarsely chopped walnuts  
 juice of 1 lemon  
 1/3 cup water  
 Cook above ingredients for 5 minutes or until thick over low heat and set aside. Grease and flour 9 inch square pan.  
 1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed  
 1/2 cup margarine or butter  
 3 cups oatmeal  
 Mix above ingredients thoroughly and press half of mixture into pan, spread date mixture on top, and add remainder of oatmeal mixture, spreading over evenly. Bake in oven 375 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes. Cut into squares while still warm. Lydia says she has found it easier to remove squares after they have cooled.
