Boardman was placed on step six of the salary schedule by the board. A salary index for coaches was established over some objection, principally that of Chairman D. O. Nelson, who said that he believes coaches receive more for extra duty than other teachers do. Under the plan, a high school football or basketball coach will receive six percent above his base salary for coaching duties, baseball or track four per cent, and assistant three per cent. Grade school football or basketball coaches will receive five per cent additional, baseball or track and assistant three per cent. Each coach will be paid \$25 for each overnight trip.

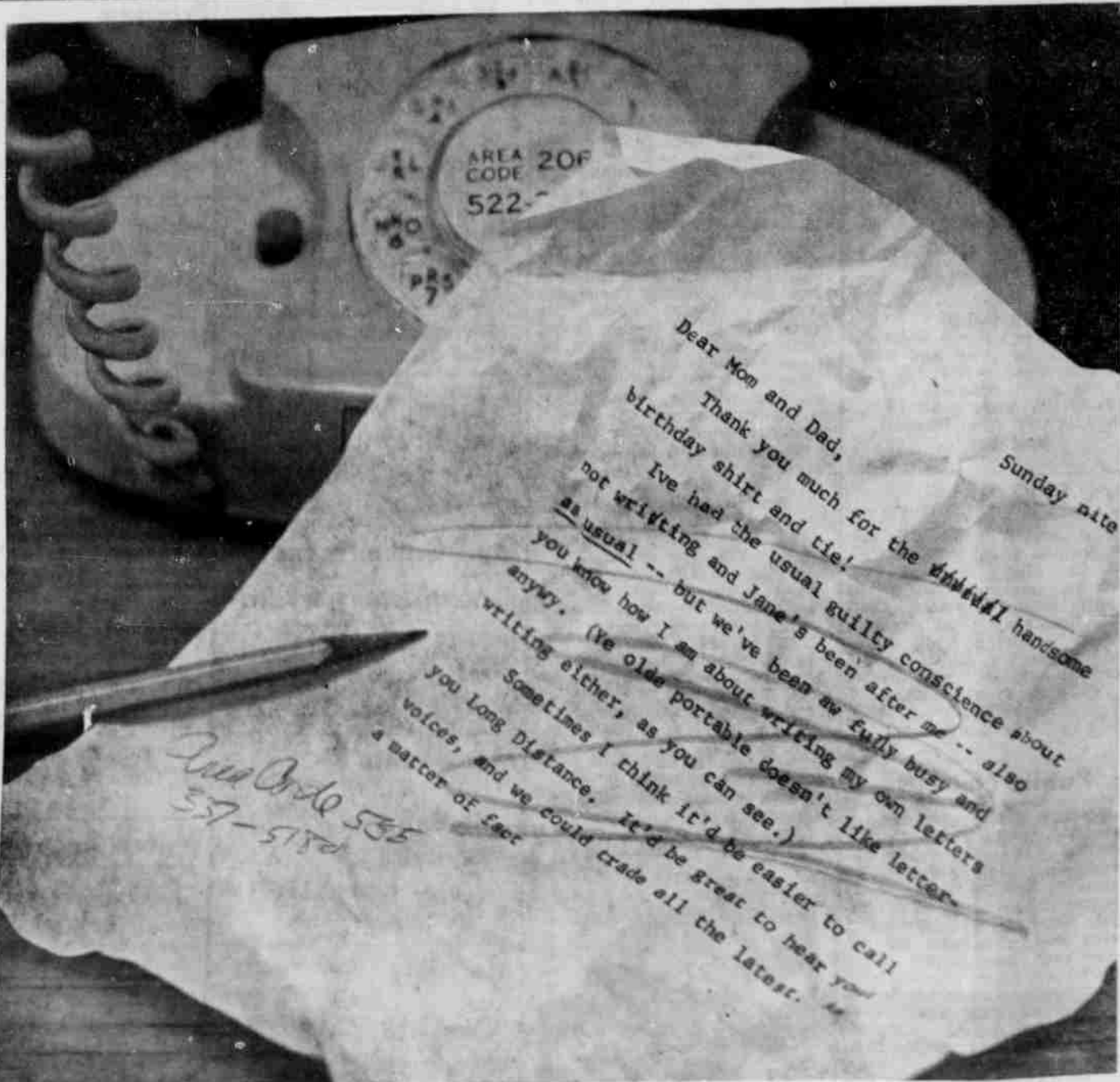
