Oregon Farm Net Income For 1961 Averages \$2,418

Caught between rising costs and lower prices, Oregon farmers realized an average net income of \$2,418 last year, 18 per cent less than the year before, according to Mrs. Elvera Horrell, Oregon State University extension agricultural economist.

Oregon farmers, along with those in most western states, received less money for their produce last year while costs went up. Mrs. Horrell said. Only Arizona, New Mexico and Wyoming in the West had net incomes per farm over 1960.

Cash receipts from farm marketings in Oregon totaled nearly \$393 million for 1961, 5 per cent less than in 1960, she noted. Basing her survey on U. S. Department of Agriculture reports and other information, the economist said that just over half the total receipts came from crop sales, while livestock and livestock products made up the rest.

Government payments in 1961 added another \$10.4 million to the cash intake, about \$1.6 million more than in 1960.

Although dollar figures aren't yet available, preliminary USDA reports show that higher costs more than offset a lower feed bill and a decrease in depreciation and net rent.

Total cash receipts from farm marketings in the 11 western states ranged from an 8 per-

cent drop in Montana to a 7 per cent increase in New Mexico last year. While California and Colorado remained the same, the averagedrop for the region was ones per cent, she reported.

On the basis of total cash receipts during 1961, California ranked first and Iowa second in the nation. Oregon was ranked 31st in cash receipts among the states and 33rd in realized net income per farm, Mrs. Horrell said.

Nationally, both farm operators' income and farm workers' wages climbed in 1961, raising income from farming to the highest level since 1928. The trend appears to be continuing into 1962 as tentative estimates place January receipts slightly above the same month a year ago, she observed.
