

Homer Green Dies Here on April 1

Homer Denver Green, 74, died in the Pioneer Memorial hospital, Heppner, Sunday, April 1, after being in the hospital for four weeks. He had made his home at Lexington for the past 5 1/2 years, prior to which he had engaged in farming in the Eight-mile district for many years.

Funeral services were Wednesday, April 4, at 2 p. m. in the Creswick Mortuary with the Rev. Walter Smith, pastor of the Lexington Church of Christ, officiating. Interment was in the Heppner Masonic cemetery.

He was born February 7, 1888, in Harrison, Ohio, son of William Perry and Elizabeth Green. The family moved to Eastern Oregon in 1907, and he has lived here since that time.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Mary Pearl Green of Lexington; two daughters, Mrs. Lucille Marvell of The Dalles and Dorothy Green, Heppner; four sons, Harry, Kenneth and Floyd, all of Lexington, and Jerry Green, stationed in Hawaii; seven grandchildren; one sister, Nellie Christie of Cheyenne, Wyo.; and several nieces and nephews.

Winners of the fair will show their projects to the audience. The meeting is held in the grade school multipurpose room starting at 8:00 p. m.

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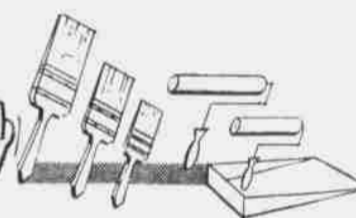
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
