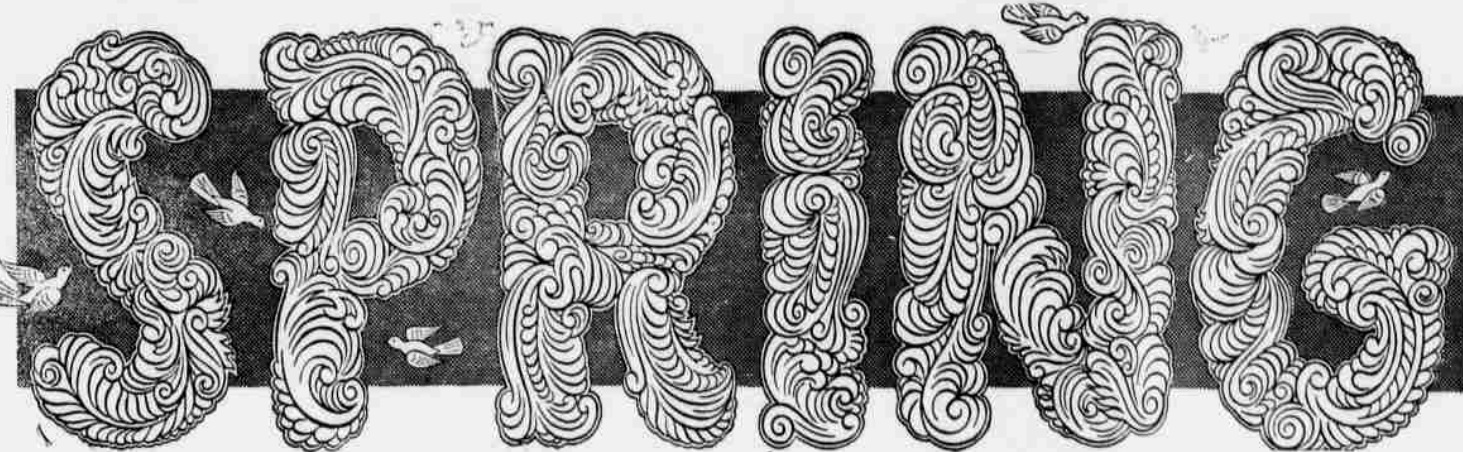

Many of the patterns are simple-to-make with a minimum of pattern pieces, planned especially for those just starting to sew. Opening the show are sets of separates "Starred for Beginners" in shades of turquoise. Two versions of one blouse pattern are shown, one tucked into a full skirt and the other worn out over a slim skirt . . . and all three patterns are in teen and junior sizes. Separates for subteens also are included.

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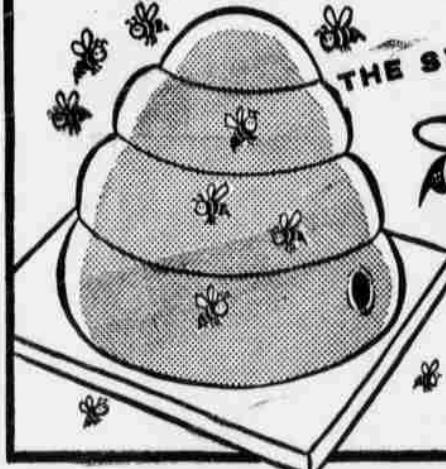
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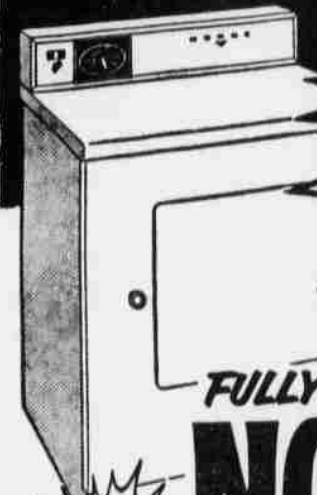
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
