Ronald Black, chapter instructor, stated that competition was very keen this year, and that very good quality workmanship was displayed by boys from all of the competing schools. He further stated that the kind and quality of work being done in our vocational agriculture departments in training boys in the field of agriculture and other related occupations shows the interest and the need for this kind of instruction in our high schools.
