

Club Hears Talk on Dahlia Culture By Wm. Rawlins

IONE—William Rawlins, local farmer, was guest speaker on the subject of Dahlia Culture at the meeting of the Ione Garden club April 10, at the home of Mrs. Fannie Griffith, with Mrs. Ronald Bishop assisting.

Mr. Rawlins gave a thorough discussion and demonstration which covered all phases of digging; storing in dry sawdust or sand; rooting of sprouts; cutting tubers into proper divisions; use of a disinfectant (napthoprene), lime or sulfur on cut portions; labeling tubers with indelible pencil; staking at time of planting; pinching back terminal shoots when about one foot high, and the importance of removing old blooms when back petals begin to wither.

Tuesday, May 1, has been set for the annual plant, food, pie and coffee sale by the club. Orders for Chrysanthemums will be taken immediately by Mrs. Fredrick Martin or Mrs. Phil Emert. Advance orders for Dahlia tubers from the Rawlins Dahlia farm will also be taken.

Special thanks were extended to those women outside the club who helped serve and donate cake for the dance supper which added \$34.15 to the Danny Akers Benefit fund.
