THE RECIPE comes to me this week from Oma Cox and is a tasty peach pie.

Southern Belle Peach Pie
2 cans canned cling peach halves
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/3 cup sugar
1 T flour
2/3 cup dark corn syrup
1/4 t salt
2 eggs
1 t vanilla
3/4 cup chopped walnuts
Single pie crust pastry
Drain peaches, cream butter with sugar and flour, blend in corn syrup, salt, lightly beaten eggs and vanilla. Arrange peaches in pastry-lined pie pan, pour egg-mixture over peaches and sprinkle nuts on top. Bake at 425 degrees for 15 minutes, reduce heat to 375 and bake 30 minutes longer, until center is set.

Decorate with whipped cream, peach slices, and walnut halves if desired. Serves 6 or 8.

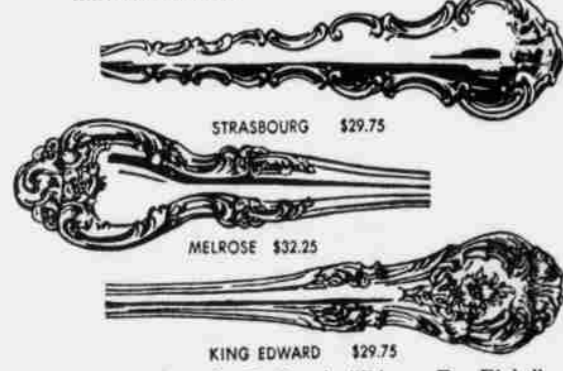
