Lowell Chally, Morrow county public welfare administrator, is scheduled to attend an Institute on County Administration in Salem on May 14 and 15.

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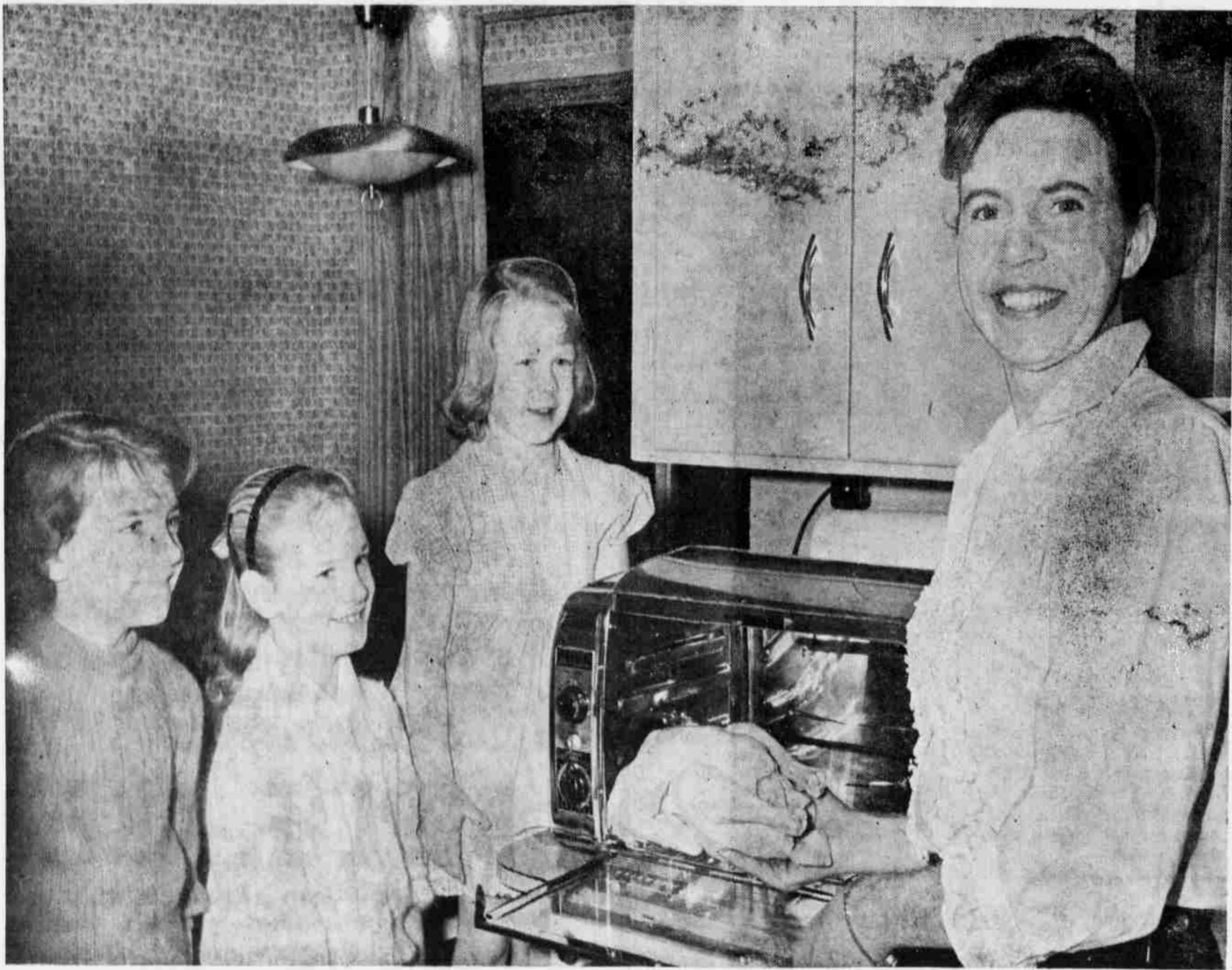


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
