Interim Group To Study Parks, Recreation Plans

Central Oregon's parks and recreation plans and problems will be discussed May 25 at Prineville by the Legislative Interim Committee on Natural Resources.

Senator Boyd Overhulse, D-Madras, chairman of the subcommittee on Recreation and Parks, said the Prineville meeting was first stop of a four-meeting schedule for the committee to air natural resource problems of Central and Eastern Oregon.

Similar sessions are scheduled May 26 at Lakeview and June 23 at Burns. Others may be scheduled in the Eastern Oregon area later in the year.
