Morrow county was one of 17 counties in Oregon exceeding last year's campaign receipts in the 1961 Christmas Seal sale, which closed March 31, 1962, announces Mrs. L. E. Dick, Jr., county seal sale chairman.

In per capita achievement, Morrow county ranked fourth in the state. Clatsop, Sherman, and Portland were the only districts ahead of this county, which reported 25.4¢ per person. Morrow county's contributions totaled \$1253.70.

Of the amount received, 74% remains within the county. The cost of the drive is small since all clerical help is donated. The largest expenditure during each year is for X-ray equipment and to pay the expenses of taking and reading the chest X-rays which have been made free at Pioneer Memorial hospital.

### Morrow Voters Choose Thomson And Ferguson

a 2-to-1 margin, 709 to 336. They approved the measure on legislators' salaries, though, 634 to 462, and the measure carried across the state.

Proposal to establish a \$115,000 county road tax base, doomed by the eleventh hour announcement that the State Tax Commission had declared it illegal, lost in the county by virtually 2-to-1, 665 no to 361 yes. Strangely, however, one of the county's nine precincts voted in favor of it, Northeast Heppner, 50 yes to 42 no.

There were no candidates for Morrow county district attorney on the ballot, even though incumbent Robert Abrams' term expires this year. He received the nomination on both ballots, getting 29 votes on the Republican side and 23 on the Democratic ticket. He indicated Wednesday, however, that he planned to hold his resolution and would not accept. Abrams is obliged, however, to continue in office until a successor is chosen. J. J. Nys received five Republican write-in votes.

Republicans elected the following precinct committeewomen: Gena Leonard, Lexington; Margaret Troedson, Ione; Hazel Bauman, Southeast Heppner (by write-in); Mrs. Conley (Vi) Latham, Northwest Heppner (by write-in); Thelma Smethurst, Southwest Heppner (by write-in); Rachel Dick, Northeast Heppner (by write-in); Marguerite Houghton, Irrigon (by write-in). Hazel Mahoney tied with Hazel Bauman, each with two votes in Southeast Heppner, but Mrs. Mahoney, when contacted by Mrs. Parrish, said that she would not accept. The others listed by write-in votes above must also be contacted and some may not accept. In most instances the winners polled only two or three votes.

Garland Swanson, with no opposition, received nomination on the Republican ballot for county port commissioner with 539 votes, and George Wiese, without opposition, on the Democratic ticket, received 273 votes. Two terms are expiring, and thus two are to be elected in the fall. Jim Farley received two votes for the post on the Republican ballot, and since two were to be nominated, he may be a candidate in the fall if he chooses. Mrs. Parrish said that she had sent him a certificate of nomination, which he may accept or reject.

There were few capricious write-in votes cast in this election although dozens of persons received single votes for many offices. Among them were Oscar Peterson, one vote for governor; Charles Sprague one for governor; and Fred Martin, one for U. S. Senator.

Republicans turned out to vote in about 61 per cent of their registration. They cast 675 votes in the assessor contest, the highest number polled for any office, and their total registration is 1110. Democrats, without the incentive of any county contests,
