**Social Security In County Climbs**

Total Social Security benefits of \$376,968 are now being paid each year to residents of Morrow county, according to Vernon A. Welo, Manager of the LaGrande district.

This amount represents an increase of approximately 17 percent over the annual rate of one year ago in Morrow county.

"Reasons for the increase are many," Welo explained. "There are more aged people; benefits are now payable to men at age 62 as well as women; and less social security credit is needed to be eligible for old-age benefits."

The \$376,968 being paid annually in Morrow county goes to 462 beneficiaries. The payments include those for old-age survivors of deceased workers, and for disabled insured workers, Welo said.

The average monthly payment to a retired worker in Morrow

county is \$76.09. The average monthly payment to a disabled worker is \$84.91.

The table below shows the number and amount of each major type of benefit being paid in Morrow county: Retired worker, 285, \$260,244; wife or husband, 63, \$31,344; widow or children, 54, \$37,080; disabled workers and dependents, 15, \$13,140.

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**Pipe and Power Line Danger Emphasized**

Metal pipes will conduct electricity as readily as power lines, a Pacific Power & Light Company rural service specialist warns in the company's annual reminder that irrigators should exercise extreme caution when moving the long lengths of pipe during the irrigation season.

Lee Hansen, PP&L's rural service supervisor, warns that the practice of unending irrigation pipes to remove sand and silt can be extremely dangerous in the vicinity of power lines.

"All farmers and employees should make a mental note of the location of all power lines in the vicinity before moving any pipe or mobile sprinkler system equipment and should always be alert to avoid any contact with the electric lines," Hansen said.
