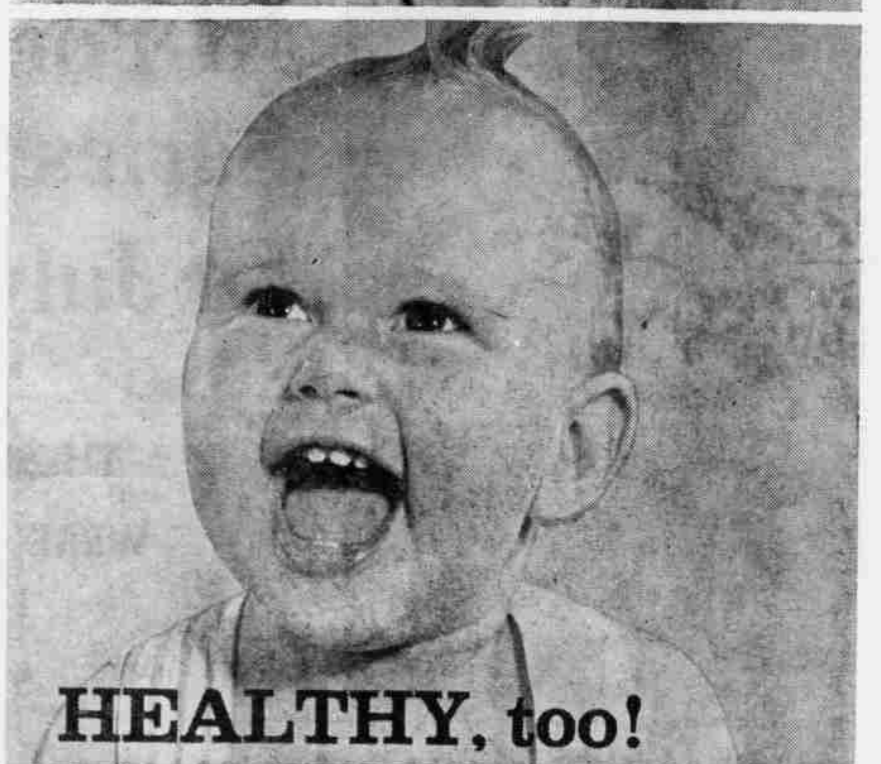

To avoid further misunderstanding on the part of the unfamiliar and to lay to rest rumors to the contrary. . .

Be it understood: The Episcopal Church in America and the church in Heppner, known as All Saint's Episcopal church, does not refuse to join in Holy Matrimony, persons who might apply for same who are baptized with water in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost by an ordained minister, pastor or priest representing Eastern Orthodox Catholic, Roman Catholic, Anglo-Catholic (Episcopal) persuasions.

By the same token, be it known: Baptism administered by ordained clergy of the Methodist, Presbyterian, the United Churches of Christ, Lutheran and other orthodox Christian bodies is held by the Anglican World Council, of which the Episcopal Church is a part, to be of equal effectiveness if within the above-mentioned "TRINITARIAN FORMULA."

Be it further understood: The Sacrament of Holy Baptism is not withheld from any person or persons, living in health, dying in sickness or advanced years, regardless of color, nationality, social standing or financial worth and political persuasion, who . . . "do truly confess them of their sins with a humble and contrite heart and intend to lead a new life according to this beginning" . . . and, or, in cases of extreme emergency, at the request of the family, administer same to the critically ill, the Baptismal Blessings of The Church.
