3 Little League Teams Knotted For First Place

Three games remain for the Little Leaguers which will conclude July 14 with another doubleheader. The Braves, Giants, and Indians will all be out for wins in the next games. As of now they are tied for first place with four wins and two losses each.

The Dodgers are in last place with six losses. All teams have a lay off this week with games resuming Monday, July 9.

The Giants pulled out a win Wednesday over the Dodgers, 10-5. In the fourth inning they scored four runs to go ahead of the Dodgers, 8-5, and went on to score two more in the fifth. The Giants had tallied three in the first, but the Dodgers bounced back with five in the bottom of the first and held the lead until the fourth.
