Lemon Cream Cheese Salad With Shrimp Dressing

1 3/4 cup hot water
2 pkts lemon jello
3/4 T. lemon juice
1/2 t salt
1 pk. 8 oz. cream cheese
1/4 cup light cream
1 cup sliced celery
1 cup pitted ripe olives (sliced)
1 cup whipping cream

Pour hot water over jello and stir, add lemon juice, salt, cool until syrupy; soften cream cheese with the light cream, beat into gelatin mixture, stir in celery and olives, whip cream until thick and fold into mixture. Pour mixture into mold and refrigerate.

Dressing

1 cup salad dressing or mayonnaise
2 T. lemon juice
1 1/2 T. finely chopped onions
1/4 cup finely chopped pimento
1 1/2 cup chopped shrimp, crab, or both
Mix together and serve over set salad.
