

# Hearing To Study Area Fish and Wildlife

BOARDMAN—The Walla Walla District of the corps of engineers is making a review of the potentials for development of the fish and wildlife resources of the John Day Reservoir area to determine if measures should be considered to improve these resources. Col. J. H. Beddow, district engineer, has announced that results of recent studies by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife service indicate that appreciable benefits could be realized, if the waterfowl potential of the John Day Reservoir were fully developed.

To achieve maximum waterfowl benefits, the service proposes a waterfowl management area utilizing approximately 9,000 acres of suitable project lands and the purchase of approximately 3,300 acres of additional private lands having a high potential for waterfowl utilization. The management area lies along both the north and south shores

of the reservoir for a distance of about 18 miles, roughly of equal distance upstream and downstream from Blalock Island near Boardman.

A public hearing, to obtain the views and comments of local interests on the proposed plan of improvement, will be held at the grange hall in Boardman, starting at 1 P. M. Tuesday, August 28. Col. Beddow has invited all interested parties to be present or represented, including private individuals and representatives of federal, state, county and municipal agencies, as well as civic groups and property owners concerned. At the hearing the plan of development will be thoroughly explained, along with the benefits expected.

Oral statements will be heard, but for accuracy of the record, all important facts and arguments should be submitted in writing.

With 4-H and FFA members as well as adults busily preparing exhibits for the fair everyone's thoughts are turned toward the many preparations that are needed to put on a successful fair. Each year in preparation for the fair an annual clean-up day is held. This year's clean-up day has been scheduled for Saturday, August 18, starting at 9:00 a.m. Four-H leaders, parents and other adults interested in the fair such as division superintendents, etc., should plan to attend the clean-up day. With a large crew on hand, the fairgrounds can be readied for the fair without working a hardship on anyone.

There are many jobs which need to be done in readying the fairgrounds for this year's fair. Among these are setting up the judging arena and putting down the sawdust; setting up bleachers, cleaning out barns and setting up pens and cages for sheep and poultry, and setting up tables and shelf area for inside exhibits which includes grains, flowers, canning, art work and many others.
