

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

County Court met in regular session, July 5, 1962. The minutes of the previous term were read and approved.

Due to an over-assessment, Emil Groshen was refunded the sum of \$42.14.

An election was held on July 25, 1962, and 37 votes were cast in favor of, and none against, forming the Boardman Vector Control District.

An election was held on the 16th day of July, and 79 votes were cast in favor of, and 10 against, forming the Ione-Lexington Cemetery Maint. Dist. Three directors elected were: Albert Lindstrom, Ione; Edgar E. Peck, Lexington; and Carl Troedson, Ione.

The Court ordered that County vehicles be used for business purposes only.

A resolution was drawn up by the County Court that all County employees be granted 5 days sick leave with pay, in any one calendar year, and 10 days vacation with pay in any one calendar year.
