Football coach Jim Sutherland of Heppner High school reminded players this week that equipment will be issued Friday and Saturday, but made one small amendment to his earlier announcement.

He plans to attend the Shrine game in Pendleton and so suits will not be issued to non-lettermen Saturday evening, as originally announced, but from 2 to 5 Saturday afternoon. This includes freshmen.

Suits will be issued to lettermen from 2 to 4 Friday afternoon and from 7 until 9 p.m.

First practice will be Monday night, August 27, under the lights on rodeo field starting at 7:30. Visitors are welcome to come and watch the drills, the coach said.

Kay Robinson was on a "chipping-in" spree Tuesday—three times in a row, and two times for par.

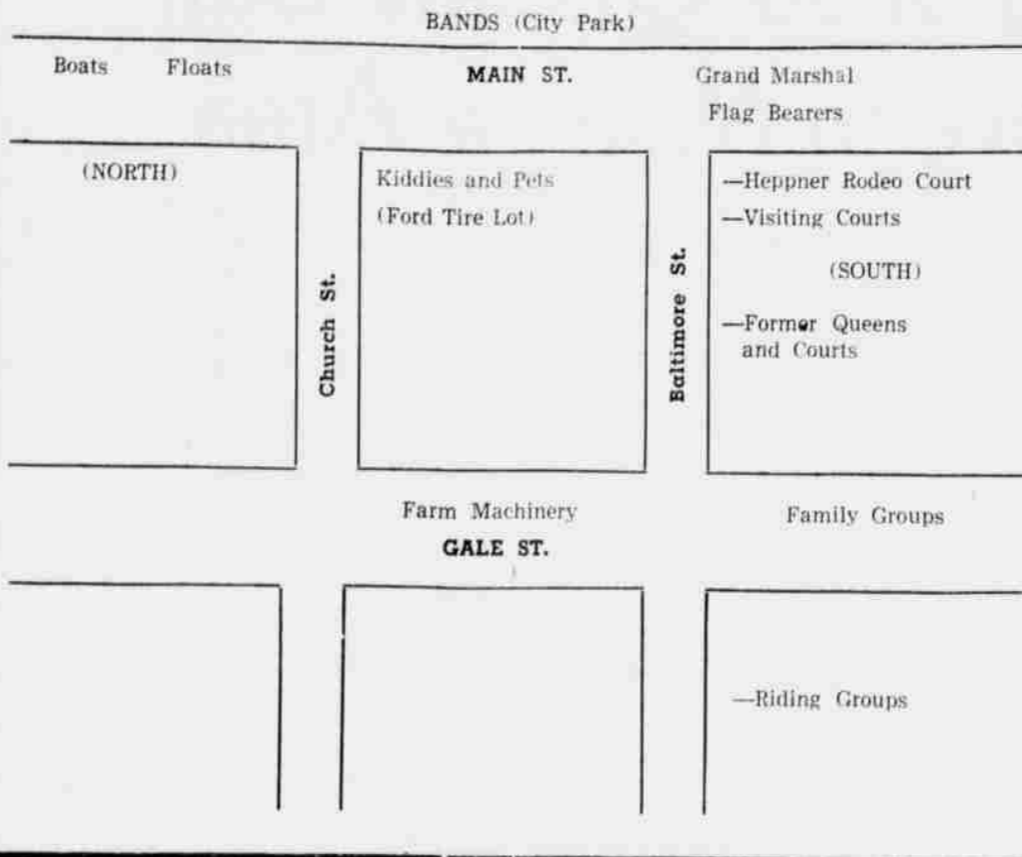
"Twas quite a day last week—after so many hit the swamp, I took off my shoes and found 12 golf balls.
