

Mustangs Point For First Grid Contest Sept. 14

Although school has just started, Heppner High school's football team is rapidly rounding into shape after starting regular practices on August 27.

Coach Jim Sutherland said that he figures that his team is three or four days ahead in practice over what it was last year at this time and has another week to go before the opening game with Enterprise on the Heppner rodeo grounds field the night of Friday, September 14.

Opening game last year was a week ahead of this year's schedule, and so the team should be in better shape for the first contest. Their first game last season also was with Enterprise but it was played at Enterprise. The Walla Walla county school thumped the Mustangs in that one, 27 to 0. Their team, composed of sophomores and juniors last year, will be packed with veterans this year, but Coach Sutherland feels that the Mustangs will give them a pretty even battle in this season's contest.

Returning to the Heppner squad are 12 lettermen in the turnout of more than 50 men. Three good prospects were lost by transfer, David Proudfoot to Pendleton, Dan Wardwell to Hermiston and Darryl Dick to Corvallis. Graduation took its toll, with such men as Merlin Hughes and Ladd Dick in the line, and Bruce Moyer and Eddie Howard, backs, completing their high school careers. How a red's speed will be greatly missed.

Basically a young squad this year, the Mustangs will have four or five senior starters and will have several backfield units. Quarterbacks on hand are Ken Smith and Shan Applegate, although Smith may turn out to be the signal caller and Applegate may be pressed into duty as a halfback.

Although losing three by transfers, the squad picked up one good candidate from another school, Fred Hurdan of Mitchell. He is a 5 ft. 11 in senior back and an honor student. Also, John Porter, who transferred from Pilot Rock after football season last year, is on the squad and will add weight to the line.

The squad will boast a heavy line from end to end this year, the coach reported, although weights and names have not been released as yet pending selection of a starting team.

Scrimmage of the squad is scheduled for Saturday night from 7:30 to 8 o'clock and the public is invited to come and watch for a preview of the 1962 edition Mustangs.

Morrow Ballots For Wheat Quotas

Morrow county farmers followed the state and national trends when they voted in favor of the 1963 wheat marketing quotas in the election Thursday.

However, less than 50% of those eligible in the county cast ballots, David McLeod of the ASC office said. The count in the county was 255 in favor and 26 against. The number against the quotas was the most ever to be in opposition here, he said.

The total vote was down more than 100 from the number voting last year. Umatilla county also voted for the quotas, but the turnout there, too, was light.
