

## Services Monday For Anna Partlow, 45-Year Resident

## Mining Claimants Told of Options

The Bureau of Land Management has informed Wright T. Mallory, forest supervisor, Umatilla National Forest, that September 6, 1962, was the date of first publication of notice on the Ellis Area, Morrow county regarding surface resource rights on unpatented mining claims pursuant to Section 5 of the Act of July 23, 1955 (Public Law 167, 84th Congress). This notice will be published for nine consecutive weeks under the heading "Notice to Mining Claimants, Oregon, 6-SR-14-12."

Maps of the Ellis area now being published and copies of the Multiple Use Mining Law of July 23, 1955, and of the procedure for the determination of surface rights set up by the law are available for inspection at the Forest Supervisor's office, 116 S. Main St., Pendleton.

A claimant has two options under the law. He may ignore the notices, thereby waiving rights to the surface until the claim goes to patent yet maintaining his original rights. The claimant may file a verified statement asserting his rights to the surface. In that case his claim will be examined by mineral examiners.

Claims of questionable validity will be considered before a hearing officer of the Bureau of Land Management, Department of the Interior, who will make the final decision. Both the claimant and the Forest Service will present their testimony at the hearing. Whatever the decision, the claimant will retain his mineral rights. If the decision is in the claimant's favor, he also retains all surface rights.

Section 4 of the Act of July 23, 1955 shall not be used for purposes other than prospecting, mining, or processing operations, or uses reasonably incident thereto; that such claims will be subject to the right of the United States to manage and dispose of the vege-

tative surface resources thereof and to manage other surface resources thereof; and that, except to the extent required for mining operations and uses reasonably incident thereto or to provide clearance for such operations or uses, claimants of such claims shall not use or dispose of vegetative or other surface resources thereof; and that, except for clearance for such purposes, any permitted severance or removal of timber must be in accordance with sound principles of forest management. Said section 4 also provides that any use of the surface of any such mining claim by the United States, its permittees or licensees, shall be such as not to endanger or materially interfere with the prospecting, mining, processing or reasonably incident uses by the mining claimant.
