

Mustangs Rap Condon, 22 to 7

Pulling out all the stops, Heppner High ran roughshod over Condon here Friday night in an exciting football game, 22-7, before a crowd of record-setting size, topping even the number of spectators who witnessed the home opener a week earlier.

Dominating the plucky Blue Devils in every department, the Mustangs registered a safety and a touchdown in the second quarter after thwarting a Condon touchdown bid in the first period. They added two more touchdowns in the third stanza, and with extra points made on two of three tries, finished scoring at that point. Condon came back with its lone score in the fourth quarter and made the point.

The Blue Devils recovered a fumble early in the game that gave them the ball on the Heppner five, but they couldn't put it over and the Mustangs took over. On a sustained march, the home eleven went to Condon's 5-yard stripe, being culminated by a long gainer on a neatly-executed handoff play while Quarterback Ken Smith swept wide with the ball, then giving it to Shan Applegate.

An illegal procedure penalty after a couple of futile running attempts forced the Mustangs to give possession to Condon, though, and the Blue Devils took over within their own 10-yard line.

On the first play the ball went to Dennis Herbison, John Porter, who has been a one-man game for Heppner in his first grid year here after transferring from Pilot Rock, and David Hanna, another defensive stalwart, broke through and nailed Herbison in the end zone for a safety and two points.

After Condon took its free kick after the safety from its own 20, Heppner moved into scoring position again. Applegate, showing his ability as a fleet-footed broken field runner for the first time in this game, romped over on a long run after he broke through the line, was momentarily halted, then twisted free of the defenders to go all the way.

LeRoy Gardner's running try for the extra point was halted short of the goal line.

Gardner sparked in action that came after halftime. He intercepted a pass on the 23-yard line of the Blue Devils and went the distance to paydirt. Quarterback Smith plunged for the extra point.

Lee Padberg, victim of three blocked punts against Enterprise, got a measure of revenge against Condon when he took a partially blocked punt of the Blue Devils in the third period on the Condon 47. The Blue Devils held the Mustangs on the next series of downs but it set the stage for the last Heppner touchdown.

Heppner punted on fourth down, and Condon took over deep in its territory. A fumble on the 15 resulted in Heppner regaining possession at that point, but a clipping penalty set the Mustangs back after Applegate had gained nine yards.

Gardner ramblid 14 yards to the Condon eight, then on successive carries, Applegate and Smith made it to the two. Larry Meussie gained one and then went over from the one yard line. A pass to Gardner was complete for the extra point.

It looked as if the Mustangs would go again for paydirt when Applegate took a Condon punt in the fourth quarter on the Heppner 45 and ran it to the

Mustangs to Face Umatilla Friday In Afternoon Tilt

Tough Umatilla High school, which has defeated Pilot Rock, 6-0, will be this week's opposition for the Heppner High school football team. The two squads will meet in an afternoon contest on the Umatilla gridiron Friday afternoon, starting at 2 o'clock.

Coach Milt Durrand's Umatilla gang uses a single wing offense and has plenty of power to roll it, according to reports. This year the team has been passing a great deal, and this is something that the Mustangs may find a problem. They have been rather weak on pass defense, and Coach Jim Sutherland has been concentrating on stopping the aerial threat during practices this week.

Doug Dubuque, who suffered a wrenched knee in the Condon game here Friday is on the doubtful list and may not be able to play against Umatilla. The ligaments were pulled in the injury, but the report is that none were torn. Dubuque has been one of the defensive standouts for the Mustangs.

For the first time, the Heppner team will be accompanied by students on spectator buses. Permission has been granted to take two buses for spectators and some 65 or 70 students are expected to make the trip by this method to support their team.

Heppner goes into the game with a 1-1 record, having lost to Enterprise, 20-0, and defeated Condon, 22-7.

Coaches and players alike have been enthused with the support that the team has been getting this year from businessmen, local residents and the stu-

Hunter Heart Tips Given

The Oregon State Board of Health told Oregon's hunters this week that more deaths from heart attacks occur in Oregon while hunting than those caused by gunshot wounds. This does not include those hunters who have heart attacks and recover.

Oregon's health authorities said that proper physical conditioning and trip planning should be as important a part of hunting safety as the proper handling of firearms.

"This precaution applies especially to those with a history of previous heart disease, those over 45 years of age, overweight persons and those whose daily activities do not require regular moderate exercise," said Richard H. Wilcox, M. D., Oregon's health officer.

A physical checkup particularly is recommended for this group before undertaking strenuous activities. The board does not suggest that the avid hunter needs to give up his favorite sport if he is a cardiac risk, but cautions that there are some common sense rules that may prevent a heart attack or lessen the severity of an attack that might occur far from medical attention.

The Oregon State Board of Health commended the Oregon Heart Association for preparing the following guide to assist the potential heart disease victim in planning his hunting trip:

1. Plan ahead. Discuss your proposed hunting trip with your physician, including the type of terrain and distances to be traveled. Start a regular physical fitness exercise program (within your capacity) a month or two before the trip. List your medications and tell a companion if you have a heart condition.
2. Plan for plenty of rest. Reduced atmospheric oxygen at

higher altitudes may require time for adjustment in breathing.

3. Plan your camp for comfort. A hunting trip need not be a survival test. Camp near available water. Dress for cold or rainy weather; it's easier to remove heavy clothing than add clothes you didn't bring. Review simple first aid rules.

4. Plan the hunt strategy in advance. Heart patients should take a stand near camp and let the others do the driving. Keep medication for heart pain in a handy pocket and inform your hunting companion where it is, what it is for and how to use it in an emergency.

5. Plan to act in emergencies. On the hike back to camp, take it easy and stop to rest frequently. Allow plenty of time. If lost, stay put, don't wander, don't panic; relax and wait until someone shows up to lead you out.

The board recommends the following procedures for a heart attack victim: Make him comfortable; keep him warm; give prescribed medicine as directed; get the patient to medical attention immediately with a minimum of exertion—no walking or riding a horse.

Jayvees Shellack Pilot Rock There

Jayvee football team of Heppner High school shellacked the Pilot Rock jayvees at Pilot Rock Tuesday afternoon, 27-0.

Two touchdowns were scored on passes and one was tallied on a run. A third came as a result of an intercepted pass.

In the first quarter, Don Munkers ran over from 10 yards out for the first touchdown. Stuart Dick made the extra point on a run. The touchdown play was set up after a sustained drive downfield. Another tally in the first period came when Munkers passed to Bruce Spencer from about four yards out, and Tim Driscoll ran the extra point.

In the second quarter, Heppner's jayvees neared paydirt two times but had to yield the ball in each case. It wasn't until the fourth that they struck again. Pilot Rock intercepted a Heppner pass on the Pilot Rock 5-yard stripe, and unable to get out from trouble territory attempted a punt. Dean Robinson of Heppner broke through, blocked a defensive man into the punter, and the ball hit the Pilot Rock defender as it left the foot of the kicker. It went straight in to the air, and Sam Strait caught it. He took two steps into the end zone and thus scored another Heppner touchdown. This occurred while the second unit of the squad was in for Heppner.

Later in the fourth, Munkers hit Driscoll with a 4-yard pass, and Tim ran the remaining six yards to score. Greg Pierce ran the conversion point.

Paul Swaggart, Jay Ball and Lee Daggett all looked good on defense, their coach, Bob Cantonwine, said. Pilot Rock only made one first down against the strong Heppner defensive effort.

Next game for the jayvees is against Umatilla here on Tuesday, October 2, at 3:30 p. m.

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
