Lower 1962 Prices Seen For Region's Wheat, Barley Crops

Prices for the 1962 wheat and barley crops grown in the Pacific Northwest probably will be lower as a result of the farm bill signed by the President, reports Stephen C. Marks, Oregon State University extension agricultural economist.

The act lowers the national average basic wheat support price by 18 cents, to \$1.82 a bushel, which will probably influence the market price.

It also appears that the basic support price for barley, main feed grain grown in the Pacific Northwest, may be reduced about \$6 a ton, although it is not known exactly how barley support prices will be operated. This would bring lower prices unless export markets become heavy buyers as they were last year, Marks notes.

Under the provisions of the bill, growers who reduce wheat plantings at least 20 percent below allotments will receive two types of payments from the government.

One will be 18 cents a bushel for the normal production of acreage devoted to wheat. The other will be payment for the acreage reduction, based on 50 percent of the value of normal production on acreage diverted to conservation uses. Neither of these payments will affect the cash market, the economist stressed.

Also entering into the wheat price picture is government action regarding carryover stocks. As of July 1, hard red wheats made up 96 percent of the carryover and white wheat, grown mainly in the Pacific Northwest, only 2 percent.

If government officials decide to build up white wheat stocks, they may hold down PL 480 authorizations under Title I of the law which authorizes sales for local foreign currency rather than dollars. Such action could cause wheat prices to stay near present levels or decline, Marks believes.

On the other hand, if the government decides to help white wheat prices rise to equal those of the hard red wheats, currently above the basic loan level due to the sedimentation test program, they could allow India, Pakistan, Formosa and Korea to have more white wheat, which they prefer, and require them to take less hard red wheat under PL 480 action.

Barley growers in 1963 who make a minimum reduction of 20 percent of their combined 1959-60 base acreage of barley, corn and grain sorghum will receive two types of direct government payments.

One will be a payment-in-kind on all barley produced on the base acreage of these three crops, Marks said. The other payment will be based on acreage diverted to conservation uses times normal yield on diverted acreage times 50 percent of the support price.

Those who do not comply with the act will receive only the income from the sale of their barley on the open market, he added.

If the new law remains in operation for the 1964 crop, barley supports may be reduced still further, Marks warns. Beginning in 1964, the law directs the Secretary of Agriculture to set supports for feed grains at a point between 50 and 90 percent of parity that will not result in addition to stocks.

Estimates for the 1962 barley not have been successful without such support.

Mustangs Move To 14-6 Victory Over Umatilla

With touchdowns in the second and third quarters, the Heppner Mustangs rang up their second straight football victory Friday when they downed Umatilla there, 14 to 6.

Larry Meussig broke the ice for the Mustangs with a 39-yard sweep to paydirt in the second quarter, aided by a key block by big John Porter.

Second score came in the second period when LeRoy Gardner smashed through the line for five yards and a touchdown. LeRoy ran both extra points.

Not to be shut out, the Umatilla eleven made it to the end zone in the final stanza on a screen pass from Mike Hiatt to Albert Eisele. The play was good for 40 yards.

Doug Dubuque, end for the Mustangs who was hurt in the Condon game, got in one play against Umatilla and then hurt his knee again. He will not be suited up for the Stanfield game there Friday, Coach Jim Sutherland said.

Gardner was an offensive standout for the Mustangs in the Umatilla game, picking up nearly 100 yards. Dick Springer did a good job on defense and blocked well, the coach said. Porter turned in another excellent defensive performance, and Lee Padberg also was cited for top-notch play.

Fred Harnden, the transfer from Mitchell, also was singled out for credit by his coach who said that he seems to be a "natural" at defensive end.

Two buses loaded with Heppner fans made the trip and swelled support for the Mustangs. It was a rainy day, but the rainfall held off through most of the contest.

Heppner's victory broke a long record of wins for Umatilla over them.

Cardinals Down Riverside, 14-0 For Big Victory

Scoring two first half touchdowns and two extra points, the Ione High school football team topped one of its most respected opponents, Riverside, in a league game at Boardman Friday, 14-0. This gave the Cardinals their first league victory of the year and their second consecutive win.

Both touchdowns came on running plays with Ken Klinger tallying in the first quarter from a yard out and Ron Crabtree, quarterback, going over on an option play from 10 yards away in the second quarter. Both extra points were scored on passes, Crabtree to Jim Martin.

It was a hard-fought game all the way, but Riverside was never able to get deep into Cardinal territory.

Coach Glenn Biehl's Ione squad got within the 10 on at least one occasion in the second half and were around the 20 another time or two but were held by the strong defense of Riverside.

Statistics compiled by Joe Hausler of Ione show that the Cards made seven first downs to four for Riverside. Five of the winners' first downs came on rushing and one each on passing and a penalty. Riverside made two rushing and two passing.

The losers showed very well on short passes, attempting 16 and completing 11. Ione attempted seven and completed three. Total passing yardage was 34 for Ione and 63 for Riverside, but Ione had definite superiority on the ground with 140 yards rushing against only 22 for the losers. Total offense favored the Cardinals, 174 to 85.

On six punts, Riverside kickers averaged 35 yards while the Cards averaged 29 on four punts. Five fumbles hurt the losers with Ione recovering three of them. Ione wasn't charged with any fumbles.

Tom Heimbigner was credited with a fine game by his coach, making four yards per carry on the average as he played half-back, switching from his regular end position. Rollie Ekstrom was

The winners took to the air to score their touchdowns, the first coming on a 25-yard pass play from Don Munkers to Bruce Spencer in the third quarter. Munkers put the extra point in the bank on a rollout.

Munkers pitched an aerial to Stuart Dick in the fourth quarter for the second tally, good for 20 yards. Simon Winters ran the extra point.

Another Heppner touchdown was nullified after Dick had run 20 yards to the end zone. A penalty kept the six points from going up on the scoreboard.

This was the second win in as many starts for Coach Bob Cantonwine's boys. Their next game will be against Pilot Rock Tuesday, October 9, at 3 p.m. on the rodeo field.

Four boys on the Mustang squad were tagged for their especially good work. They are Paul Swaggart, for real good defensive play; Carl Bauman, defensive end; Winters for his work in the second half; and Lee Daggett, stalwart as middle line-backer.

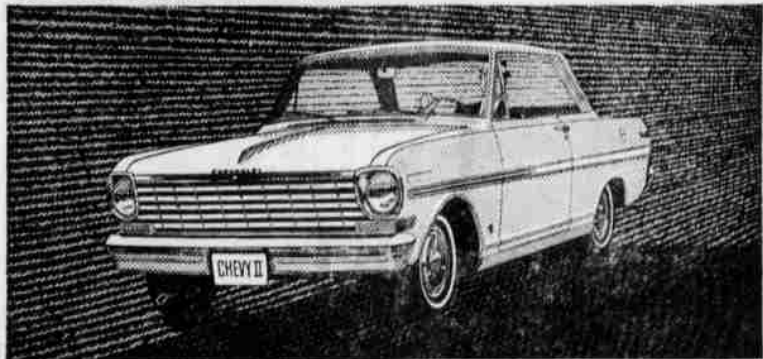
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
