Heart Attack Claims Portland Hunter's Life

Arnold M. Larson, 63, of 5006 S. E. Long Street, Portland, died apparently of a heart attack in his car some 38 miles south of Heppner Friday afternoon prior to the opening of deer season.

He and his wife had arrived with a house trailer only a short time earlier to await opening of the season, and they set up their camp at Tupper Corral, about two miles west of Tupper Guard station.

Larson told his wife that he wanted to drive down Red Hill road to get oriented for the hunt the next day and insisted on going despite her admonitions that he take a rest, she said.

When he did not return she became concerned, and the body was found in the car about four miles from the trailer camp location. Death was apparently from a heart attack. This was the first death attributed to hunting in the state.

Oliver Creswick of Creswick Mortuary took the body to Portland Saturday for services at a later time at Mt. Scott Funeral Home.

Final Rites Held For 'Deb' Wright

Funeral services for Silas Delbert (Deb) Wright, 64, were held Monday, October 1, at 1:30 p.m. at the First Christian church, Heppner. The Rev. Charles Knox officiated and interment was in the Heppner Masonic cemetery.

Mr. Wright died Thursday, September 27, at Union Gap, Wn., where he had been working. His father, Silas, was an Oregon pioneer, coming west with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Wright, and homesteading on a ranch in the Rhea Creek area in the middle 1800's. Delbert was born on the family homestead October 25, 1897, to Silas and Martha Cantwell Wright. His father had purchased the family ranch in 1884. He and his brother, Orin E. Wright, operated the ranch until Orin bought out his share at the time of his retirement several years ago.

Mr. Wright had always had an active interest in farm organizations. He was past master of Morrow County Pomona and Rhea Creek granges, as well as a past noble grand of the IOOF lodge at Hardman.
