Running high in the hobby race this year is Swedish weaving which can be used as a decorative stitch on hand towels, luncheon cloths, curtains, skirts and what-have-you.

Knowing this, the Morrow county extension committee has asked Mrs. Andy Skiles, well-known artisan from Irrigon, to conduct a training for project leaders of local extension units and other interested organizations on October 18 at the Pine City School beginning at 10:30 A. M.

Materials needed for this training include: 30" Huck Toweling (any color); 1 spool of pearl cotton thread (for decoration); needle (blunt crewel needle is best); and scissors.

Project leaders will schedule meetings in their communities as interest is shown, advised Esther Kirmis, Morrow county extension agent.

Any women's organization that would like to send one or two leaders to take this training are urged to contact the county agent's office before October 18, says Miss Kirmis.

Women will bring sack lunches. Coffee and tea will be furnished.

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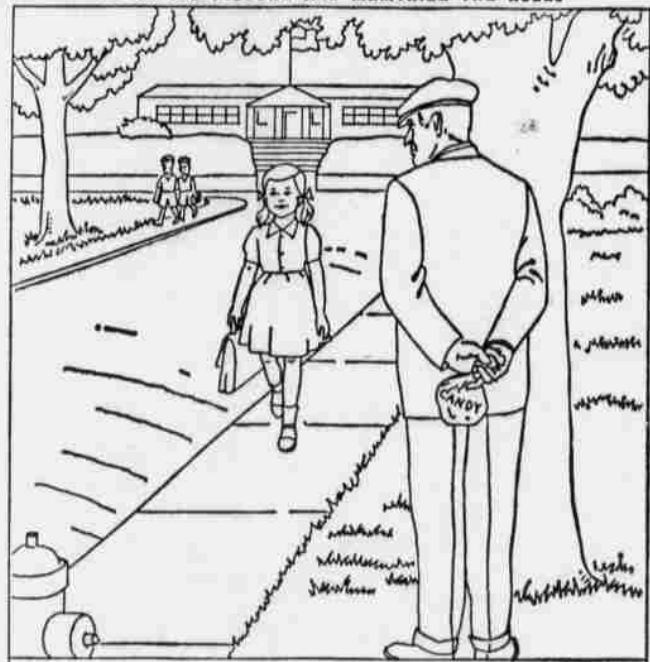
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
