

# Illness, Wreck Fatal To Two of Boardman

**BOARDMAN**—Services were held Monday at the Boardman Community church for Robert H. Miller, 63, who died of a heart attack at his home here October 11. He had been suffering from heart trouble several years. The fatal attack came while he was taking a nap before lunch.

Services were conducted by Rev. Herman R. Burg, church pastor, assisted by Rev. Bob Rayburn, pastor of the Clackamas Bible church at Clackamas. Mr. and Mrs. Francis Klontz of Starbuck, Wn., sang two numbers, accompanied on the organ by Carolyn Burg. Pallbearers were Arthur Allen, Leo Potts, John Summers, Dewey West, Seth Russell and Willard Baker. Burns Mortuary was in charge of services. Burial was in Boardman Riverview cemetery.

Mr. Miller was born November 19, 1898 in Judsonia, Ark., the son of Frank and Effie Miller. The family came to Oregon in 1921. He married Ida Chase at Kelso, Wn., April 11, 1925, and they lived in Gresham until 1943 when they came to Boardman where they have lived since.

He was in partnership with his brother, Russell, in a large potato growing business here until about 1950 when the brothers began operating independently. Russell Miller died two years ago.

Survivors include his wife at the home; two daughters, Mrs. Charles (Hazel) Phillips of The Dalles, and Mrs. Paul (Evelyn) Matt of San Diego, Calif.; a son,

Bill Miller of Palo Alto, Calif.; his mother, Mrs. Effie Miller of Boardman; two sisters, Mrs. Ralph (Gladys) Baker of Corbett, Ore., and Mrs. Jim (Louise) Harding of Sacramento, Calif., and four grandchildren.

Mr. Miller had served as a member of the national board of the Village Missions for the past several years.

**Larson Killed in Wreck**  
 Frank W. Larson, 44, was killed instantly in a collision Sunday shortly after noon with his pickup and a transport truck near Buck's Corner. Witnesses said he apparently was turning into the cafe there and did not see the truck. He was taken to the Good Shepherd hospital in Hermiston, but was pronounced dead on arrival.

Mr. Larson, who has been farming here for the past three years, was on his way back to Nyssa where he was temporarily employed. His mother, Mrs. Emma McPherson, lived here with him. He was unmarried.

He was born in Eugene July 4, 1918, and lived there until coming to Boardman in July, 1959. He was a veteran of World War II.

Survivors besides his mother include three brothers, Clarence and Ernest of Springfield; Al-Fred of Eugene; and two sisters, Mrs. L. R. Hall of North Bend, and Everal McCullum of Portland.
