Bluebird groups for second and third grade girls will be organized Friday, September 26, at 2:30 at the multipurpose room of the Heppner grade school.

Mothers as well as interested girls are asked to attend this first meeting. So far two women have offered to act as leaders. Each can handle from 8 to 12 girls and should have an assistant. If more leaders are not found, groups cannot be formed for all the girls. Volunteers are welcomed.

The program will be explained and some of the activities that can be carried on easily by any leader will be described.

The girls meet once a week, ordinarily in the home of the leader or assistant leader, directly after school. They stay about an hour. Children who ride the bus leave a little early. The girls take turns bringing simple, easily served refreshments.

Bluebirds are part of the Camp Fire Girls program. Dues are \$1.00 a year per girl.

Probable starters for Heppner will be Lee Padberg and Dean Lovgren, ends; John Porter and Dave Hanna, tackles; Dick Springer, center; Mike Lesser and Don Creswick, Bill Cox or Dubuque, guards; Ken Smith, quarterback; Applegate, right half; Meussig, left half; and Gardner, fullback.

Permanent co-captains have been elected by the team, and three share the honor, John Porter, Dick Springer and Shan Applegate.

More color will be added on the night of Homecoming game with joint appearance of the Heppner High band and the girls' drill team who will put on a halftime show.

Good crowds have followed the Mustangs this year, but the Friday night turnout is expected to be a record-setter. Stubborn Rockets Yield to Heppner In Close Contest

When Coach Bob Cantonwine said in his scouting report prior to the Pilot Rock-Heppner football game that the Rockets were tough defensively, he wasn't "woofing," as the saying goes.

The Mustangs found this out Friday night when they scratched out a 6-0 victory over the fired-up visitors, who were determined to down the Heppner eleven.

Although the Pilot Rock team couldn't seriously threaten against the Mustangs, for three periods they kept the boys of Coach Jim Sutherland from scoring against them. However, on several occasions they were given timely assists by penalties at crucial moments. An intercepted pass stopped another threat.

When the Mustangs finally hit paydirt, it seemed, oddly enough, to come easily. LeRoy Gardner had taken the ball on one of his specialties, a sweep around end, and galloped 35 yards. On the next play, Shan Applegate broke through tackle slipped free and went 20 yards to the end zone. And that was all she wrote as far as scoring goes. Even the point after touchdown try went amiss.

Statistics showed that the Mustangs had a considerable edge. They gained 234 yards on offense to 61 for Pilot Rock and made 16 first downs to the losers' five.

A new star broke into the limelight in this game for Heppner in the person of Dean Lovgren who just would not be denied on defense. He made several fine stops to stop Rocket backs for losses. On one play he broke through into the secondary, was bowled over by a blocker but quickly regained his feet to nail the ball packer for a sizeable loss. Coach Sutherland took note of Lovgren's work when he said, "He played one of the finest defensive games I've seen this year."

John Porter and Dick Springer turned in good defensive performances and Larry Meussig, Applegate and Gardner all received praise for their running.

Scoring for the Mustangs is pretty even for the season with Meussig having tallied 19 points, Applegate 18, Gardner 15, and quarterback Ken Smith 9.

Funeral services were Tuesday at 2:30 p.m. at the Lexington Church of Christ, with the Rev. Charles Knox officiating. Interment was in the Lexington cemetery. Burns Mortuary of Pendleton had charge of arrangements.

He had lived in Pendleton for the past 15 years. Mr. Carmichael was a veteran of World War I. Surviving are one son, Perry E. Carmichael of Portland, two daughters, Mrs. Margaret L. Young of Pasco, Wn., and Mrs. Frances Larsen of Salem; a brother, Clarence C. Carmichael of Heppner; three sisters, Mrs. Edna Turner of Heppner, Merle Carmichael of Lexington, and Mrs. Vida Noble of North Powder; and 14 grandchildren.

Helix Team Bows To Ione, 19-7, After Struggle

Helix put up a hefty battle, holding Ione's football team to a scoreless first half, but bowed to the Cardinals, 19-7, in a Morrow-Umatilla 8-man B contest at Helix Friday afternoon.

Playing without the services of Les Madden and Joe Halverson, both out with knee injuries, the Cardinals were unable to hit paydirt until the third quarter when Klinger took it over from the two yard line.

Klinger also made the other two Card touchdowns, on runs of 11 and 16 yards in the fourth quarter. Tom Heimbigner kicked the extra point after the second touchdown but extra point tries on the other two attempts were no good.

Helix made its lone touchdown in the final stanza when Peterson took a kickoff on his 12-yard line and went 88 yards to score. It was the first time that an opponent had taken the ball on a kickoff or punt return to go all the way against a Glenn Biehl-coached team at Ione.

A pass, Harper to Leisinger, was good for the Helix extra point.

After a so-so first half, the Cardinals came to life pretty well in the second half of the contest. Helix was able to get its hands on the pigskin for only four offensive plays in the second half. The Cards settled down to steady football and ran only about four different types of plays in the last half of the game.

In first downs, Ione had a wide edge over Helix, 15 to 3. Ione completed only two of 10 pass attempts while Helix connected on three of eight. Total yardage for the winners was 241 to 56 for Helix, and the losers made all but 10 yards on passes while Ione made 35 on passes and 206 rushing.
