Gains in both the number of orrowers and in the number of volumes were reported by the Heppner Library to the city coun-cil at the regular council meet-ing Monday night.

At the end of the fiscal year

Borrowers took out a total of 7549 books and magazines dur-ing the year, of which 6634 were fiction books and 776 were nonfiction. Unbound periodi c a l s laoned were 139. Juveniles took 4367 of the fiction books out and 192 of the non-fiction. Adults accounted for 2267 of the fiction loans and 584 on non-fiction. The circulation was a decrease from the previous year, Mrs. Blanche Brown, librarian, report-

ed. Total volumes in the library at the beginning of the year were 4635. During the period, 236 were added and 26 with-drawn, making a total number of volumes of 4845 at the end of the year Of the total 3132 of the year. Of the total, 3132 were listed as adult books and 1739 as juvenile books. Seven-teen periodicals are received, four by subscription and 13 by gift
