Services Today For E. W. Moyer

Ernest W. Moyer, well-known retired rancher, died Sunday, November 4, in Pioneer Memorial hospital at age 87. Services were held today (Thursday) at the First Methodist church, Heppner, at 2:00 p.m., with the Rev. Melvin W. Dixon officiating. Interment followed in Lexington IOOF cemetery, with Creswick Mortuary in charge of arrangements.

Born July 9, 1875, in Mohawk, Tenn., he was the son of John and Susan Sykes Moyer. He came to Oregon about 70 years ago, spending most of his life ranching on a farm near Heppner. He had been a patient in Pioneer Nursing home the past three months, and was a member of the Methodist church.

His wife, Ida, and one son preceded him in death. Surviving are four daughters, Lucille Owens, Aloha; Louise Wood, Enterprise; Caroline Moyer and Miriam Carmichael, both residing in Japan; and one grandson and several nieces and nephews.

Schools, Some Firms To Be Closed Monday

All Morrow county schools and a few business firms will be closed Monday to observe Veterans Day. The holiday falls on Sunday, and so the legal holiday is Monday, November 12.

Most of the Heppner stores, however, will remain open on Monday. The post office will be closed and there will be no incoming nor outgoing mail. The courthouse and city hall will be closed, and banks will also be closed.

The Gazette-Times office will be open as usual.

New Police Car Bought; State Refuses Pave Job

Bid of Condon Motor Sales of \$1587.13, net cost to the city of Heppner after trade-in, was accepted by the city council Monday night for the purchase of a new police car. It will be a 1963 Ford 300 Police Interceptor.

Three bids were submitted to the city, the others being by Farley Motor Company for a model 6835 Rambler at \$1569.87 plus \$61.75 for heavy duty alternator as optional equipment; and by Fullerton Chevrolet for a 1963 Chevrolet four door Biscayne sedan at \$1942.75 difference.

Decision on the purchase was made by the police committee after reviewing the bids on authority of the council after the meeting.

Included in the bids was information on various items listed in the specifications.

Funds for the purchase of the car were included in the 1962-63 budget, and call for bids was delayed until new 1963 models were available.

A letter was read at the meeting from R. S. Cox, county and city relations engineer of the State Highway department, stating that the Highway Commission had not approved Morgan street for paving under a provision that allows such state aid when a new area in a city has a street subject to unusually heavy traffic. The city had applied for funds for improving the street because of the increased traffic going to Unit-A and the new high school site.

The refusal was for the 1963 program, but the city may apply again to come under the 1964 program.

Council approved application of Elmer Leroy and Jeanne C. Berry for renewal of package beer class B and retail malt beverage class A licenses for Bucknum's Tavern.

Building permit for \$50,000 for the Heppner Elks lodge was approved. The lodge is rebuilding its hall that was destroyed by fire in May. Lorentz Brunn Company of Portland is contractor.

Front will be of 2x6 frame construction, replacing similar structure, with stucco exterior. Contractor is now at work on the job and the old Star Theater portion is being filled in with gravel. The lodge hall will occupy the space formerly used by the theater and club room will be adjoining, all on the first floor.

A letter from Chris L. Wheeler, state engineer, said that the State Water Resources Department had received the city's application for permission to drill a well of 500 gallons per minute capacity. He said the application was in order and that it would be considered for action soon.

The council authorized construction of a "California gutter" across Willow street on the west side of Main to carry excess surface water away in times of heavy runoff. Vic Groshens, city superintendent, said the work would have to wait until dry weather in order to permit laying the asphalt coating. During rain storms water backs up on Willow near Western Auto so that it sometimes covers the sidewalk and makes it difficult to traverse.

Heppner Library Gains Reported To City Council

Gains in both the number of borrowers and in the number of volumes were reported by the Heppner Library to the city council at the regular council meeting Monday night.

At the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 1962, total number of borrowers was 1137, a gain of seven from the start of the year. During the year, 56 new adult borrowers and 77 juveniles were registered. In the same time, 126 were withdrawn.

Borrowers took out a total of 7549 books and magazines during the year, of which 6634 were fiction books and 776 were non-fiction. Unbound periodicals loaned were 139. Juveniles took out 4367 of the fiction books and 192 of the non-fiction. Adults accounted for 2267 of the fiction loans and 584 on non-fiction.

The circulation was a decrease from the previous year, Mrs. Blanche Brown, librarian, reported.

Total volumes in the library at the beginning of the year were 4635. During the period, 236 were added and 26 withdrawn, making a total number of volumes of 4845 at the end of the year. Of the total, 3132 were listed as adult books and 1739 as juvenile books. Seventeen periodicals are received, four by subscription and 13 by gift.

During the year a new set of the Encyclopedia Americana was purchased by the library, and a new dictionary stand was presented to the library by the Bank of Eastern Oregon.

The library is open four hours on Mondays, four hours on Wednesdays, and three hours on Saturdays. It was established in 1929, and the new library-museum building was opened in 1960 as a gift from Mrs. Amanda Duvall to the City of Heppner and Morrow county.

Marion Green is president of the library trustees, Miss Leta Humphreys is vice president, Mrs. Nora Turner is secretary, treasurer, and other trustees are Mrs. Cornett (Florence) Green, Al Lamb and Mrs. Lucy Peterson.
