## Needs In Africa Told By Bishop

The Rt. Rev. Alfred Stanway, bishop of African Tanganyika, was a distinguished visitor here at a luncheon meeting at All Saints' Episcopal church on Saturday, November 3. He addressed the group of inter-denominational guests on the rapid development of modern Africa and the progress Christianity is making there.

At a breakfast meeting earlier in the day, Bishop Stanway addressed boys and men of St. Alban's Acolyte and Servers Guild at their first meeting of the year. He remarked on the resemblance of scenery in and around Heppner with his native Australia and parts of Africa.

Among paradoxical situations seen in Africa these days, he commented, were the monstrous road building equipment working beside a field in which a native farmer plows with a water buffalo and a forked stick; the treading of water wheels in the midst of modern irrigation and flood control districts; and the alternate scenes of feast and

famine. He appealed for more help to bring the gospel, modern medicine and hygiene to primitive Africa, where one dentist often serves several thousand people, hospital shacks care for humanity with diseases we have never heard of, and the written word to a country with 40 different tribal dialects.

Luncheon was served by the All Saints' Episcopal Church women, under the direction of Mrs. LaVern Van Marter.
