Christmas Tree Cutting Declared Passing Tradition

Christmas trees for the taking from Oregon's forest lands is a passing tradition, according to State Forester Dwight Phipps. The value of these young trees in producing a future crop no longer permits an indiscriminate harvest by the public. The cutting or removing of trees from the lands of another without permission is now a misdemeanor of some consequence. This has become especially significant in recent years with the increasing efforts of landowners to reforest their lands.

The State Forestry Department has expended much public monies to establish a new crop of trees on forest lands under their management. An extensive patrol is to be maintained throughout the cutting season this year in order to protect this investment. The patrol system has proven to be a very effective method of reducing tree losses in past years, especially in the Tillamook burn where some five to six million trees are being planted annually, and aerial seeding is taking place over large areas, in order to

No sales of Christmas tree stumpage are contemplated this year from state-owned land during the current holiday season, aside from one small sale in the Northwest Oregon District for purpose of stand improvement work.

The public is reminded that a 1957 law requires individuals transporting more than five Christmas trees to have evidence of ownership. This includes the bill of sale, the name and address of the original owner, the number of trees purchased, and the description of the land. The only exceptions are where the individual owns the land or where a common carrier is involved.

Gas Company Pays \$84,961 in Taxes

A check for \$84,961.94, the first full year's tax payment on the new Alberta-California natural gas pipeline, was delivered to Morrow County Sheriff and Tax Collector C. J. D. Bauman by Pacific Gas Transmission Company last week.

The 1,400-mile 36-inch diameter pipeline was completed last December. It carries natural gas from the eastern foothills of the Canadian Rockies, northwest of Edmonton, to cities and towns in the Northwest and to San Francisco.

Pacific Gas Transmission Company owns and operates the 612-mile Idaho-Washington-Oregon section of the pipeline.

Central Area Superintendent C. W. Bond said PGT's check is for 1962-1963 taxes on 34.5 miles of pipe and other installations in Morrow county, including a microwave communications station at Gleason Peak.
