Report in January Required of Aliens

District Director Alfred J. Urbano of the Immigation and Naturalization Service stated this week that the annual alien ad-dress report program usually causes a sharp rise in the number of applications for naturalization.

The law requires all aliens in the United States, with few ex-ceptions, to report their addresses each January. Through-out the United States, almost

per cent more applications for naturalization are received during the months of January. den rise to the Allen Address Report Program.

Forms for making the reports will be available to aliens at all Post Offices and offices of

the Immigration and Naturali zation Service during the month of January. Urbano indicated that aliens desiring information Service where personnel trainconcerning naturalization or ed in these fields will be similar matters should obtain able to answer inquiries.


