Report in January Required of Aliens

District Director Alfred J. Urbano of the Immigration and Naturalization Service stated this week that the annual alien address report program usually causes a sharp rise in the number of applications for naturalization.

The law requires all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, to report their addresses each January. Through-out the United States, almost 30 per cent more applications for naturalization are received during the months of January, February and March than are received during other months. Mr. Urbano attributes this sudden rise to the Alien Address Report Program.

Forms for making the reports will be available to aliens at all Post Offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January. Urbano indicated that aliens desiring information concerning naturalization or similar matters should obtain
