Multiple Death Mishap Toll Heavy

Multiple-death traffic accidents took more than 100 lives in Oregon during 1962, according to the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles. Of the 421 fatal accidents during the year, 45 accounted for 104 deaths. The total traffic death count for 1962 was tentatively set at 480.

The worst single accident in the state during 1962 claimed five lives in Gilliam county. A motorist failed to turn at a detour and collided head-on with a truck. The driver of the car and his four passengers died. The accident occurred at night and road surface was wet.

Other accidents that ranked among the "worst of the year" included two four-death crashes and seven three-death smash-
