**Science Center Open In Seattle**

The Pacific Science Center, in 1962 the highlight exhibit of the Seattle World's Fair, is now open permanently as the finest display of science exhibits ever assembled.

As the United States Science exhibit at the fair, the \$10 million center attracted more than 6,500,000 persons in six months. After the fair, Century 21 Exposition, operation was turned over to the non-profit Pacific Science Center Foundation.

"The Pacific Science Center offers the same incomparable show seen during the Fair," said Edward E. Carlson, Foundation president. "More than 96% of the exhibits remain, and it is our plan to add improvements constantly."

Three new exhibits—a Musser planetarium, an optical light maser and a NASA satellite-tracking display—were added in December.

Two motion picture exhibits are the only ones of their type in the United States. The first utilizes seven synchronized projectors to show the "House of Science," an introduction to the Center. The second is the Boeing Spacearium, a simulated multi-billion mile trip through space.

Three other main fair attractions, the monorail, the space needle and the Seattle Civic Center complex, are also continuing operations—to the delight of Seattle visitors.

The Pacific Science Center is presently open on week-ends only, but plans to go into full time operations this spring. Admission to the center is \$1 for adults, 50 cents for students.
