Mustangs Down Umatilla By 59-34 Score Friday

Scoring by bursts throughout the game, Heppner High's basketball team thumped Umatilla there Friday night, 59 to 34.

Both coaches used reserves liberally and all of Coach Bob Cantonwine's squad saw action. His first unit was on the floor only about half of the game.

The starters rolled up a 19 to 6 advantage by the end of the first quarter before the coach made his first platoon substitution. Although only eight points were added to the Heppner cause in the second period, they held a 27-16 halftime margin.

Coming back in, the starters went about half the third quarter before bowing to the reserves, and the end of the period saw the Mustangs in front, 40-22.

Final quarter finished on a good note for the Mustangs as they scored 19 to Umatilla's 12.

This was the 11th win of the year for the Heppner team. Dick Springer topped scoring with 13 on six buckets and a lone free throw. John Porter had nine for Heppner.

The game saw the return to limited action of Doug Dubuque, 6-2 center who has been on the injured list most of the season.

The fans who made the trip over to Umatilla from Heppner found it difficult going on the way home, hitting a glaze of ice on the highway between Lexington and Heppner. Packed snow covered most of the rest of the route.

Ione Holds Fourth Place With Win Over Stanfield

Ione's Cardinals remained firmly entrenched in fourth place in the Umatilla-Morrow basketball league after defeating Stanfield there Friday night, 47 to 38.

The Cardinals currently have a record of seven wins and four defeats in the circuit.

Their game with powerful Umatilla, scheduled for the Ione maple-court Saturday night, was postponed until a date to be decided later in the season because of the inclement weather and icy condition of the roads.

Jim Martin came through to lead the Cards to victory in the Friday game as he scored 17 points on five field goals and seven straight free throws.

Ron Crabtree, who had been on the sick list, saw action and made 12 points for the Ione club.

High for Stanfield was their all-star athlete, Kip Clark, who made 16 points on seven field goals and two free throws.

Ione jumped to a quick early lead and was ahead, 17 to 9, by the end of the first period. However, by halftime the Stanfield team cut the margin to two points, 21-19, on the heels of a poor 4-point quarter by the Cards.

The winners did a little better in the third quarter, getting eight points to Stanfield's seven, and then won going away with 18 points in the final quarter.

Shooting of the two teams was about even with Ione hitting 17 of 45 attempts and Stanfield getting 16 of 43.

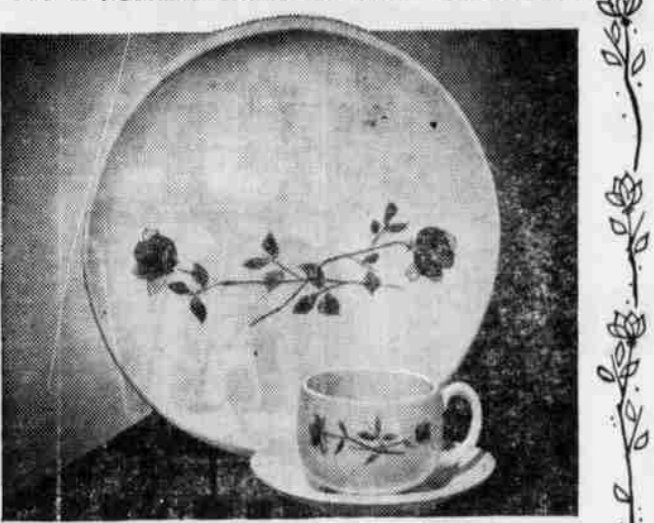
